KFPD Celebrates 20 Years Contracting with ECFD!

The Kensington Fire Protection District contracted for services with the City of El Cerrito in 1995. At that time, the fire district's finances were in perilous condition. The Board consulted with neighboring cities and the Contra Costa County Fire Protection District before electing to contract with the City

of El Cerrito. We are proud that when we contracted with the city not a single Kensington fire-fighter lost his or her job; all transferred either to the City of El Cerrito or the Contra Costa County Fire Protection District.

Under the contract, the Kensington Fire Protection District continues to own the public safety building and all equipment, including two engines. El Cerrito provides personnel and administration. Today the District has only one employee – a half-time administrator.

Pursuant to the contract, our local station is staffed round the clock with three firefighters, at least one of whom is a paramedic. The Fire Chief operates the two El Cerrito stations and the one Kensington station as one functional unit. As a result, our engines may respond to calls in El Cerrito and El Cerrito's engines may respond to calls within Kensington. We are proud that the median response time in Kensington is 4 minutes, 59 seconds.

This current fiscal year our contract fee to El Cerrito is \$2,319,185. Not surprisingly given the nature of the contract, almost ninety per cent of that fee is personnel costs. Kensington has one-third of the firefighters on duty in a fire station. We share with the city a Fire Marshal, Training/EMS Director,

Operations Chief, Support Service Chief and Fire Prevention Officer. Yet we are charged only 27.75% of El Cerrito's personnel cost.

The contract can be terminated by either the city or the

Fire District giving the other one year's notice of their intent to end the relationship. The notice period is designed to give each entity time to adapt to this dramatic change in operations.

Under the contract the Fire District is required to set aside an amount equal to the annual contact fee in a reserve account in order to assure the city of its financial ability to pay for the services.

CERT TRAINING:

Utilizing the national CERT curriculum, this 20-hour program is designed to assist residents of Kensington to be self-sufficient in the event of a disaster. The first session will take place at the El Cerrito Community Center, 7007 Moeser Lane, El Cerrito on Wednesday evenings from 6:30 to 9:00 p.m. The final drill will take place on a Saturday. CERT participants receive free emergency preparedness items

This class is from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. at the Arlington Park Clubhouse (1120 Arlington Blvd.) in El Cerrito. Holiday Fire Safety

The holiday season is one of the most dangerous for household fires. By taking a few safety precautions, you may save your family from the devastating effects of a house fire.

Many artificial trees are fire resistant and much safer than cut trees that will eventually dry out. However,

if you pick a cut tree, a fresh tree will stay green longer and be less of a fire hazard than a dry tree. Tips on choosing a fresh cut tree:

• Fresh needles are hard to pull from branches.

When bent between your fingers, fresh needles do not

- The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin.
- When the trunk of a tree is bounced

on the ground, a shower of falling needles shows that a tree is too dry.

Once you have selected a fresh cut tree:

- Cut off about two inches of the trunk to expose fresh wood for better water absorption, and keep it well watered.
- Place trees away from fireplaces,
 - radiators and other heat sources.
 - Check light strings for frayed or damaged wires. Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. Turn off all lights on trees and other decorations when you go to

bed or leave the house.

- Use no more than three standard-size sets of lights per single extension cord.
- Never use candles on or near trees!
