MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER 27, 2010 SPECIAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENSINGTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

CALL TO ORDER:

President Ramsey called the meeting to order at 5:07 p.m. and noted the Directors that were present and that Director Kosel was excused. The meeting took place in the Public Safety Building.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

None.

OLD BUSINESS:

Legal Correspondence and Discussion regarding the Kensington Fire Station Exterior Improvements and Site Accessibility Project: Director Dommer reported that Kel-Tec, the District's general contractor for the project, sent a letter earlier in the month stating they could not proceed with the project and they were filing for bankruptcy. The letter was included in the packet. Navellier, Dommer, Mack5 and legal counsel have all been working together and agree that the District does not need to rebid the project. Mack5 has started the process to find another appropriate contractor. At this point, Mack5 is negotiating a price with Swinerton construction company. Dommer feels the price that Kel-Tec bid was very low. The estimates that both the architect and the project manager put together, estimated the project at \$350,000-400,000. Once a price is negotiated, the District should approach the surety company with their choice of contractor. The District does not know how the surety company will want to proceed; they may want to get several prices/bids on the project or pick their own contractor. The surety company is potentially liable for the amount it takes to get the project complete, above Kel-Tec's price which is what the District would have paid anyway. The District does not have to give the project to the one other bidder, since they were in effect rejected when the District chose Kel-Tec. The Board discussed the timing of the project with a concern to the upcoming winter months. Dommer explained Mack5's current role in the project and how they are operating as an extension of the District's staff. Their current goal is to line up a contractor for the District. Dommer added that the schedule of the project is completely unknown at this time. Everyone agreed that the contractor's default could have been much worse if the project had already been started.

NEW BUSINESS:

Resolution 10-07 Authorizing the Administrator to Submit a Claim with the Project Surety Company, Financial Pacific Insurance Company, and Negotiate with Surety so that the Project is Completed as soon as Possible as Close to the Amount of the Original Contract as Possible: Director Ramsey made a motion to approve Resolution 10-07 as submitted in the Board packet. Director Dommer discussed the roles of legal counsel and Mack5 and who would actually negotiate with the surety company. Director Blaschczyk seconded the motion.

Structure Fire Caused by Dryer Lint Build-Up

At approximately 7:30 on November 24, 2010, the El Cerrito-Kensington Fire Departemnt responded to a reported structure fire in the area of Ganges Court and Ganges Avenue. Engines 71, 72, 65, 64, Truck 64 and Battalions 71 and 64 were on the initial dispatch. While responding, dispatch advised that there were several calls reporting smoke and flames in this area. B71 requested ECPD and an AMR unit to assist with traffic control and for medical standby.

Battalion 71 arrived on scene within five minutes of the initial call to find a two-story single family dwelling located at 1709 Ganges Avenue with heavy fire and smoke pushing from the front part of the home including the garage, kitchen and family room, and smoke throughout the home. B71 established Ganges Incident Command and assigned all operations to tactile channel #1.

E71 arrived shortly afterwards and was assigned to fire attack with instructions to extend a line to the front door. Due to the heavy fire load, E72 was assigned to pull a back up hose line to assist E71 with suppression. E64 was assigned to RIC (rescue crew) and E65 was assigned to take a hose line to the second floor and check for fire extension and complete a primary search. T64 was assigned to secure all utilities and to open the garage door where there was extensive fire. B64 was assigned to the rear of the structure for reconnaissance.

E71 advanced a hose line to the front door and was met with heavy smoke and heat and fire rolling over the top of them from the garage. Along with the assistance of E72's crew, they made entry and found heavy fire in the kitchen and all the way out to the garage though an open door. E71 obtained knock down on the fire shortly after entering the structure. During this time B71 made contact with the occupant/owner of the house and confirmed that everyone was out. After knock down of the fire, the interior crews completed the primary survey and confirmed that no one was inside.

At this point crews were hampered in that anything metal in the house was electrically energized and was delivering shocks to the personnel. The electrical panel was double checked and confirmed that the main breaker was turned off; however somewhere there was a short that was bypassing the breaker. All personnel exited the house to wait for PG&E. Once PG&E arrived and disconnected the power at the pole, overhaul of the garage and kitchen was completed.

In speaking with the occupants, everyone was in bed. One of the occupants had been up approximately 30 minutes prior and had started a load of clothes in the dryer and then returned to the bedroom. At approximately 7:30 another person in a bedroom on the second floor was awaken by the smell of smoke and went to investigate. He stated there was no smoke in the house, but he saw it outside the front coming out of the garage. He proceeded to open the interior door to the garage and found heavy smoke and flames inside. He further stated that he did not close the door to the garage but instead proceeded to wake everyone up and get them out of the house.

Upon further investigation of the dryer, it was apparent that the fire started inside or behind the dryer and spread from there. There was a large build up of lint, and old clothes and other debris were behind the dryer and damage was most concentrated around the appliance. As mentioned above, excessive damage was done to the garage, kitchen and family room. There was also very extensive heat and smoke damage throughout the rest of the house. The family did have insurance on the dwelling and a representative arrived prior to the fire department leaving. The City Building Department was notified and they red tagged the structure.

Four adults were displaced by this fire and Red Cross was called in for assistance for the family. The Fire Department had one person with a minor eye injury due to flying particles. That individual was seen at Kaiser and was diagnosed with a scratched cornea but was released for full duty with a follow up appointment.



Since the Board's Special Meeting on October 27, 2010, I have submitted the attached letter to Financial Pacific Insurance Company and also received the attached reply dated November 11, 2010.

PCA Consulting Group has since rebid our project, going back to the originally prequalified contractors though only one of those responded (the second original bidder). In addition, they inserted one of their own contractors, and KFPD insisted that they add Swinerton that Mack5 had spent so much time pursuing and fine tuning their price. PCA held a non-mandatory walkthrough bid at the station on November 30th. The only contractors that attended was John Plane Construction (the second original bidder) and CB2 (PCA's invited contractor). Both I and a Mack5 representative attended that meeting and walkthrough. PCA has set a two-week bid time (bids due 12/16/10) which Mack5 feels is extremely unrealistic partially due to the fact that the architect is out of the country and cannot answer Requests for Information or an Addendum to clarify some items.

Matt Lavrinets of Meyers Nave, Joe Blanco of Mack5 and I have all stayed in constant communication to watch this issue closely and to insert the District's needs/wants into the process. Mack5 has been very busy communicating with PCA and comparing PCA's bid documents to our original bid documents where they have found several conflicting documents. PCA has been receptive though not thoroughly transparent. Both Matt and Joe are questioning PCA aggressively about their proposed Tri-Party Contract that they put into their own bid documents to hand out to the new bidders. Our other options, which apparently are much more common, are a tender contract (in short, FP pays KFPD the difference and walks away) or a take-over contract (FP through PCA manages the building project). I believe there would be a clear preference for the tender contract.

- 10. Kensington Fire Protection District will approve all progress payments and rule on the acceptability of all work. The completing contractor will be required to prepare two pay applications. The first will be based on the original schedule of values of Kel Tec Builders. The second will be based on the new rebid schedule of values. The pay applications are to be submitted to the Kensington Fire Protection District for approval.

Kensington Fire Protection District will be responsible for payment of the value of work performed based on Kel – Tec Builders' schedule of values. Financial Pacific Insurance Company will be responsible for the payment of the difference between the original schedule of values and the rebid schedule of values.

Payment by Kensington Fire Protection District shall be made to the Financial Pacific Insurance Company or to the completing contractor at the option of the Financial Pacific Insurance Company.

11. With respect to any questions prior to the bid opening these questions will be routed through Mr. Jack Costenbader, Consultant for Financial Pacific Insurance Company. If a question is directed toward the Kensington Fire Protection District, it should be directed to the Consultants mentioned above, not directly to the Kensington Fire Protection District. When one bidder has posed a question, such question will be made known and the answer to all the bidders.

- 12. All the contractual requirements of the Kensington Fire Protection District must be complied with.

Any liquidated damages which may be assessed for calendar days beyond the new completion date, will be the responsibility of the completing contractor at the rate of \$ 500.00 per calendar day.

For every day prior to the new completion date, that the completing contractor achieves completion for which liquidated damages would have been assessed against Financial Pacific Insurance Company the completing contractor will receive \$250.00 per calendar day. If there is not assessment of liquidated damages by virtue of a separate agreement between Financial Pacific Insurance Company and Kensington Fire Protection District there will be no incentive program.

14. Each bidder will be responsible for confirming status of work in place. Live Inc.

The cost shall include all direct and necessary production costs of the work itself; i.e., labor and items incidental to labor (such as, but not limited to, public liability and workmen's compensation insurance, old age and unemployment insurance, social security), pro-rata charges for foreman, material and the use of power tools and equipment. Among the items to be considered as overhead and not as cost are insurance other than as mentioned above, premium on bond(s) required by the contract, supervision, superintendents, timekeepers, clerks, watchmen, small tools, incidental job burdens and general office expense.

For additional work requested by Kensington Fire Protection District, the specifications shall govern pricing.

Financial Pacific Insurance Company will agree to submit claims to Kensington Fire Protection District; however, Financial Pacific Insurance Company will thoroughly review said claims. Any claim submitted to Kensington Fire Protection District shall be at the sole cost, expense, including attorney fees, expert fees, at the risk of the successful bidder. The successful bidder shall agree that it shall be bound by the decision of the Contracting Officer or if the successful bidder wishes to appeal the contracting officer's decision it shall be bound by the decision of the appropriate appellate body, the Armed Services Board of Contract Appeals, Federal Circuit or the United States Supreme Court, any appeal of the Contracting Officer's decision shall be at the sole discretion, cost, expense and risk of the successful bidder. successful bidder shall agree that Financial Pacific Insurance Company shall be not held liable or responsible to the successful bidder for any

2010 MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Legislative Issues

Safeguarding Special District Funding Key Partner on Prop 22

Through significant financial and organizational support, CSDA joined cities and other local government advocates in qualifying and passing the strongest protection of local budgets to date. Supported by 61 percent of voters statewide, the Protect Local Taxpayers and Vital Services Initiative prevents the state from taking, borrowing or redirecting special district funding.

Close Watch on the State Budget

Once again, CSDA monitored the full state budget process and provided valuable reports and feedback to its membership. In this difficult economy where the state continues to face multi-billion dollar deficits, budgetary vigilance is more important than ever.

Retaining Local Control & Ensuring Independence

Municipal Bankruptcy Autonomy: Assembly Bill 155
When a number of public employee unions sponsored
legislation to move a critical local decision to a state
commission, CSDA and a coalition of opponents stood
up in defense of local control. AB 155, which would
have required a state commission's approval for a
district to file bankruptcy, failed passage.

Constitutional Reforms to Local Powers

In response to measures introduced in the Legislature that would have given county boards of supervisors new authorities over the services of special districts (Assembly Constitutional Amendment 18), CSDA engaged legislators regarding key reform principles.

Leading Proactively on Transparency

The now infamous salary scandal of the City of Bell made national headlines, heightened public scrutiny and prompted the Legislature to introduce numerous bills impacting all local governments. CSDA quickly took a proactive approach to this critical issue by representing special districts at critical legislative hearings and providing members with tools to stay ahead of the issue, including a new transparency resources webpage, compliance training and regular communication on the latest news.

Strengthening Coalitions

CSDA gave members influence in the biggest issues facing local government. Through involvement and leadership within numerous coalitions, CSDA partnered with allies and shared in developing key strategies on mutually beneficial causes such as public contracting and workers' compensation legislation that otherwise could have cost special districts millions of dollars.

Bringing Districts Together at the Capitol

2010 Special Districts Legislative Days
In May, CSDA members of all types of special districts
met in Sacramento for a dynamic two-day legislative
conference where they heard from exceptional
speakers and met with legislators and Capitol staff.



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Why is Evacuation from Wildfire Different?

Warm dry weather, dense flammable vegetation and structures, steep terrain combine for a volatile wildfire equation. Living within the wildland urban interface means that planning for evacuation in case of wildfire is a necessity.

With some hazards evacuation can be predicted days ahead of time and routes can be predetermined. When hurricanes or tsunami are predicted, evacuation routes that move people inland and uphill play key roles. During flooding or potential mudslides, routes chosen are away from waterways or unstable hillsides. After an earthquake the best routes do not depend upon major bridges or other structures that may be unstable.

But for wildfire, such pre-determined evacuation routes are not a viable solution given the variable nature of ignitions and dynamic spread of fire. The homeowner must develop options for evacuation routes and destinations.

Wildfires are Unpredictable.

While fires can follow predictable spread patterns, many factors are unpredictable:

- Wildfires often threaten a community with limited warning. Red flag conditions hot, dry, windy days increase the chances of an ignition growing to major conflagration. Where and when an ignition will start a fire cannot be predicted.
- Wildfire typically moves alarmingly fast. As the fire grows larger it can create its own wind from the updraft of flames and produce even more unpredictable fire behavior.
- Wildfire changes rapidly as it burns across the landscape. Fire responds to terrain and fuel characteristics whether grass, shrubs, trees, homes moving faster, burning hotter or casting more embers.
- New fires can start ahead of the main fire. As embers are carried in the wind they can land miles ahead to start additional fires.

Evacuation routes may become un-usable

Some evacuation routes may become un-usable during a particular fire incident. As a fire progresses it may call for changes in evacuation plans.

- The changing path of the fire may block potential routes.
- The need for emergency personnel to access the fire may fill available routes to capacity.
- Smoke from fire can reduce visibility and make evacuation routes unsafe.
- Evacuation destinations may be threatened by the fire.

Challenges of no-notice evacuations

No-notice evacuations, whether due to natural or man-made incidents, are always a challenge. Wildfires can be like man-made technical disasters such as hazardous materials releases, chemical spills or terrorist acts that require whole portions of communities to be evacuated. Emergency response agencies require strategies to deal with key challenges such as:

- Limited information
- Ability to incorporate flexibility and compromise existing plans
- Rapid assessment of feasibility of tactics
- Compromised infrastructure (fire blocks, accidents, traffic clogs)
- Limited resources (transportation, road network capacity, personnel, communications)

Urgency – there may be limited time to prioritize and allocate resources

Why Develop a Family Plan and Practice for Evacuation from Wildfire

Self-evacuation, or use of personal transportation is the most common way for residents to respond to a wildfire. However, the multiple cars and stress levels of their drivers may cause greater congestion on egress routes. When faced with dislocation and potential of unknown, wildfire related dangers, people are likely to be under considerable stress. Under these circumstances, people may not act as rationally as might be normally anticipated. Given the safety concerns during egress it is important to every resident to pre-plan for evacuation from wildfire. Plan at least two different ways to reach major roads or freeways from your home and place of work. Drive all potential routes before you need them and keep an up to date road map in your car for reference.

The number one reason to evacuate from wildfire is safety. You are a safer if you leave a threatened area well ahead of the fire. In addition, the presence of residents in the fire zone will slow efforts to fight the fire, as firefighters avert their fire suppression activities to protect lives.

When and How to Evacuate

Evacuation Tips for Wildfire provides an overview of the evacuation process and evacuation checklists to help you plan, including where to get more preparedness help and up to date information. Obvious signs of wildfire include smoke, flames or news from your neighbors. Notifications may include door-to-door notification, siren alert or mobile loud-speaker

In most cases, law enforcement personnel will provide you evacuation directions. However, If you are ordered to evacuate and not given specific instructions, drive carefully toward main roads out of your neighborhood, to connect with major streets or freeways. Once clear of the area go to a friend's house or parking lot out of the hazard area. If you are required to stay away from your home for a long period, shelters will be designated by the Red Cross or other local authorities.

If you have time before you evacuate, review your optional evacuation routes. For road conditions, reports of construction or closures call 511 or connect with Caltrans web site www.dot.ca.gov/cgi-bin/roads.cgi.

Wildfire Evacuation Tips

Evacuations save lives and allow responding personnel to focus on the emergency at hand.

Please evacuate promptly when requested.

Practice before a fire. Drive all potential routes of escape out of your neighborhood or from work before an actual emergency.

THE EVACUATION PROCESS

Law enforcement agencies are typically responsible for enforcing an evacuation order. Follow their directions promptly.

You will be advised of potential evacuations as early as possible.

You must take the initiative to stay informed and aware.

Listen for your neighborhood warning siren.

Tune your radio/ TV for announcements from law enforcement and emergency personnel.

Program your local emergency number into your cell phone. Local emergency numbers:

If you use a cell phone to call 911, the call may go to California Highway Patrol in Vallejo and not to local emergency providers.

EVACUATION ORDERS

There are many terms that may be used to alert you to the significance of danger from wildfire.

Leave lights on in house – door unlocked. ☐ Leave windows closed – vents/ air conditioning off. Identify in advance where to meet if you get separated. Select a common friend or relative to call. IF YOU BECOME TRAPPED WHILE IN YOUR VEHICLE ☐ Stay calm. Park your vehicle in an area clear of vegetation and power lines. Do not block the road. Keep the engine running and headlights on. Roll up windows and set the venting system to re-circulate to reduce smoke in the car. ☐ Cover yourself with wool blanket or jacket. Lie on vehicle floor. ☐ Use your cell phone to advise officials – Call your local emergency number. WHILE ON FOOT ☐ Stay calm. ☐ Go to an area clear of vegetation, a ditch or depression, if possible. ☐ Lie face down, cover up. Use your cell phone to advise officials - Call your local emergency number. WHILE IN YOUR HOME ☐ Stay calm, keep your family together.

- ☐ Call your local emergency number and inform officials of your location.
- ☐ Fill your sinks and tubs with cold water.
- ☐ Keep doors and windows closed but unlocked.
- ☐ \$tay inside your house.
- ☐ Stay away from outside walls and windows.

Note: It will get hot in the house. But it is much hotter, and more dangerous outside.

RETURNING HOME

Fire officials will determine when it is safe for you to return to your home. This will be done as soon as possible considering safety and accessibility.

WHEN YOU RETURN HOME

- ☐ Be alert for downed power lines and other hazards.
- ☐ Check your residence carefully for hidden embers or smoldering fires.
- ☐ Check propane tanks, regulators and lines before turning gas on.



Prepare large animals for transport.

Set up a ladder for access to the roof.

Move propane BBQ appliances away from structures.

Place connected garden hoses and buckets full of water around the outside of the house.

Cover up. Wear long pants, long sleeves shirt, heavy shoes/ boots, dry bandanna for face cover, goggles or glasses. 100% cotton is preferable.

Leave lights on in house – door unlocked.

Leave windows closed – vents/ air conditioning off.

Identify in advance where to meet if you get separated. Select a common friend or relative to call.

Evacuations save lives and allow responding personnel to focus on the emergency at hand.

IF YOU BECOME TRAPPED

While in your vehicle

Stay calm.

Park your vehicle in an area clear of vegetation and power lines. Do not block the road.

Keep the engine running and headlights on. Roll up windows and set the venting system to re-circulate to reduce smoke in the car.

Cover yourself with wool blanket or jacket.

Lie on vehicle floor.

Use your cell phone to advise officials – Call your local emergency number.

While on foot

Stay calm.

Go to an area clear of vegetation, a ditch or depression, if possible.

Lie face down, cover up.

Use your cell phone to advise officials ---Call your local emergency number.

While in your home

Stay calm, keep your family together.
Call your local emergency number and inform officials of your location.
Fill your sinks and tubs with cold water. Keep doors and windows closed but unlocked.

Stay inside your house.

Stay away from outside walls and windows.

Note: It will get hot in the house. But it is much hotter, and more dangerous outside.

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
