# **CONSENT CALENDAR**

### MINUTES OF THE DECEMBER 13, 2017 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENSINGTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

### **CALL TO ORDER:**

President Don Dommer called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and noted that all Directors and the staff that were present.

### APPROVAL OF CONSENT ITEMS:

President Dommer called for the approval of the consent calendar (items 3, 4, 5 & 6), consisting of approval of the November 8, 2017 minutes, approval of the October 2017 incident activity report, approval of the November 2017 incident activity report, and approval of the monthly transmittal #6. Director Nagel made a motion to approve the Consent Calendar items as submitted. Director de Ville seconded the motion.

### **ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:**

Ciara Wood thanked Board members and the Chief for attending the 11/12/17 End of Fire Season gathering. It was very successful with about 25 members of the community along with the EBRPD manager of Wildcat Canyon. Wood emailed the Board members earlier today with demographics of the contributions she has received for DFSC so far this year. A number of Berkeley and El Cerrito residents have donated, and then there is a listing of street by street donations from Kensington residents. She announced that she has raised \$12,637 in donations to DFSC so far this year.

President Dommer reordered the agenda and moved to item 9 under New Business.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

Presentation of Geophysical Investigation Results for the Public Safety Building site (217 Arlington Avenue) by Kevin Ryan, Ryan Geological Consulting, Inc.: President Dommer introduced Kevin Ryan and Linda Liang from Ryan Geological and Rockridge Geotechnical, respectively. Kevin Ryan also introduced himself as an engineering geologist that specializes in geological hazards. Ryan explained that he and Rockridge were hired to look at the existing station at 217 Arlington. Ryan said that during a development or expansion the geological team has to look at the State designated map and the Ahlquist-Priolo special study which the current station falls within and is in a State special zone that goes along the Hayward fault. Ryan displayed a copy of the State designated map showing fault zones. Any development, expansion, etc. designated for human occupancy has to go through a full geological study. There are three fault zones near the current public safety building. More recently the USGS has identified two potential faults near the fire station. One is west of the building and another questionable one is just east of the building. Ryan explained the difference between solid and dashed lines on the State map - solid is more confident; dashed is more questionable. Ryan said the geological team was constrained with trenching by the property boundaries of the site. A geophysical investigator was brought in to attempt to look beyond the property boundaries. Ryan reviewed a graphic showing the geophysical lines extending from Amherst Street through 220 Amherst, through the parking lot of 217 Arlington and across Arlington Avenue. Ryan explained a geophysical study. The geophysicist found that the uphill side shows fresh, unweathered, fairly hardened bedrock and the downhill side shows weathered different type of bedrock on the site in question. There is a discontinuity--two different geologic units next to each other. One option is that it could be a fault. There is a 13-foot tall retaining wall in that location. Since the area can't be viewed, one has to assume it is a fault. In order to investigate the area, the retaining wall would have to be removed, support the area and neighbors above it, dig a trench and then replace the wall. Since that is not a practical approach, the geological team has to assume there's a fault at the retaining wall. The building code says that if there is an active fault (which is the assumption) there has to be a set-back. The site is extremely limited for expansion on the uphill side. The downhill side of the property has an adequate set-

back. There is not an opportunity to demolish the building or expand the footprint in the eastward direction unless the absence of an active fault can be thoroughly disproved. As an essential services facility the building code demands the facility be designed to withstand an earthquake. Ryan said set-backs are based on the character of the fault and the associated area of surface deformation that can happen during any one event. Typically, set-backs must be 50 feet. When there is constraint from property boundaries, a 25-foot set-back could be considered with a very rigorous study to prove that would be outside of the potential surface deformation. Ryan explained that the fault line is a geologic feature. The seismic line in the report refers to the cable that the geophysicist ran for his study. Ryan explained the geophysicist's process again. Ryan explained that while evaluating a fault, the geologists want to evaluate in a perpendicular fashion. They were constrained by the surrounding existing buildings. The District was able to get access to 220 Amherst, then across the parking lot of the site and down the driveway. The seismic lines were based on access. Ryan again said that they found a significant discontinuity that in all likelihood is an active fault. De Ville pointed out that the geological teams' findings are all supported by existing data. Ryan said there are at least 10 maps that show a fault in that location and their findings match a lot of existing data. The entire area around Kensington and Berkeley have been heavily studied. The existing building set-back is about 35 to 40 feet from the eastern property line. It is not practical to disprove the assumption of an existing fault along the property line. Ryan added that it is not a good location for a fire station or critical facility. Karl Kruger noted it is a public safety building. A resident had a question about the location of the retaining wall and the seismic lines. Jim Watt asked about the depths that are shown on Figure 3 that demonstrated the seismic refraction results. Ryan said it was between 35 and 25 feet. He explained the area of concern is the discontinuity between SL-1 and SL-3 on Figure 3. He further explained that the area of concern is the two different materials shown between up and down slope. Linda Liang further clarified the concern with the discontinuity in response to Watt's questions. The area of concern is unfortunately where the retaining wall is. Watt asked if the discontinuity could be from the excavation for the retaining wall. Ryan explained that the data shown is 15 to 20 feet below the retaining wall and pointed to it on the graphic. Gail Feldman asked for the depths of the geophysical survey results again. Anthony Knight asked how the geological team's methods differed from "coring". Ryan explained that coring is a vertical penetration that samples a diameter of 2-1/2". One could core and easily straddle a fault and not see it. Ryan prefers the trenching approach; however, in this case, they cannot trench through the retaining wall nor east of the retaining wall on private property. Coring would show two different rock types on the property and east of the property would still not show evidence of a fault. Knight asked what would be hard evidence of a fault? Ryan said to be 100% certain of a fault, the geologists would need to see the zone through trenching. There is currently very big difference in the geology between the properties and all regional maps suggest there is a fault present. Watt asked about a couple of borings into the wall. Ryan again, explained that they would need to prove that a fault doesn't exist and trenching would be preferable. If the District were to expand the building they need to prove there is no fault along the retaining wall area. Ciara Wood asked about the discontinuity between the project site and Arlington Avenue? Ryan explained that the soils do basically match-up between the parking lot, site and the Arlington. There is some variation but that is explained by excavation and previous exploration trenches in 1969. Ryan said the "green" layers on Figure 3 were mélange and the "blue" layer is something harder. Ryan explained that if the decision was made to expand or rebuild the existing building the geologists would still need to conduct a fault study. It's possible that the fault study would demonstrate an active fault and then a 50-foot set-back would be necessary. Ryan explained the process of being hired to trench, regrouping and hiring a geophysicist instead. Ciara Wood asked what the next step is. Ryan said the geologists will wait for direction from the District. Dommer said the issue would go back to the Public Safety Building committee for discussion. Watt asked about another firm reviewing the geophysicist's work. Project Manager, Paul Beamer explained that a peer reviewer was hired (and is required) to review the geological team's work. Ryan said the peer reviewer's report would be in response to anything that Rockridge and Ryan publish on the project. Linnea Due asked for clarification that new construction could not happen at the site but renovation is allowed? Ryan said as long as the District doesn't increase the footprint then the geologists don't get involved. Again, Due asked about the possibility of increasing the footprint. Ryan said it was extremely constrained and going toward the west of the property is constrained by the Arlington. The north property line only has about a 5-foot set-back. It is a postage stamp sized site. Even if an adjacent property was purchased for expansion, the District would have to go through a fault study and the same constraints would apply being located between two faults which is not a good idea. Gail Feldman asked if Ryan looked at any physical evidence above the ground. Ryan said that the USGS map documents all geologists work noting things like off-set curves, broken pipes, warped fences, etc. Yes, they hike around to find those notations. They reviewed aerial photographs. The only thing they haven't done is dig a trench through the parking lot. Again, they will wait for District direction. Feldman asked if the discontinuity could be from a landslide. Ryan, said yes, but they have to assume it is a fault because they can't see it and there are at least a dozen articles identifying a fault in that location. Ryan again referred to the State geological map. As a professional geologist, all evidence points to it being a fault unless proven otherwise. Director Nagel asked about the expense of trenching through the retaining wall area. Ryan explained

that step one would be to mobilize up-hill with a giant drill rig to put in piers to support the hillside, then take out the 13-foot retaining wall and the 13-foot wide footing that goes 9 feet into the hill at the base of the wall, trench, and then patch the wall and hope it holds or the District will have bought the up-hill property. De Ville pointed out that this would all be to prove that this is the only and best location in Kensington to put a fire house. Ryan said if there are other locations available that the current one is less than ideal. Testing the area would probably be in the neighborhood of several hundred thousand dollars. Either live with what we have or find another location. Anthony Knight asked how many geophones are along the survey lines? Ryan said the geophones are every 10 feet. Jim Watt asked why the geophysicist didn't run a line parallel to the retaining wall. Ryan again explained that they investigate perpendicular to the potential fault. Running a parallel line could give them all one feedback. The geophysicist wants to cross the area since their surveys measure a change in distance. Watt asked why not "X" across the line? Ryan answered: access and budget. The data results are gathered after being in the field. Once the results were gathered they were conclusively enough to stop working until the District directs otherwise. The retaining wall was built in 1969. Ryan said Loma Prieta was too far away to affect the retaining wall. There is a difference between shaking and surface fault rupture. One can build to withstand shaking but surface rupture needs to be avoided. Ryan, Liang and Beamer all left the meeting. Dommer said that the Public Safety committee consists of Director Harmon and himself along with staff members Chief Maples and Manager Navellier.

### FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT:

Chief Maples reported that this year El Cerrito-Kensington has transitioned to the Marine Corps' Toy for Tots program. Toy barrels and boxes are at all the fire stations, El Cerrito City Hall and Community Center, and numerous businesses throughout the community. There was a fundraising pancake breakfast this past weekend at the El Cerrito Community Center where approximately nine barrels of toys were received. Maples credited Engineer/Paramedic Damien Carrion for leading the project for the department.

Maples reported that OES 300 went to the Creek fire on 12/5/17, two strike team leaders to the Skirball Fire on 12/6/17, and E372 to the Thomas Fire. E372 and the strike team leaders have been cleared and are headed home but OES 300 was reassigned to another fire.

Maples also passed out the recent CERT postcard that was mailed to all residents and businesses in Kensington and El Cerrito. The first session for 2018 is already full in response to this public outreach.

### **NEW BUSINESS CONTINUED:**

Request from Kensington Green to Consider Opt-Up to Marin Clean Energy's 100% Renewable Electric for the Public Safety Building: The speaker for this item was not present. Navellier explained that Contra Costa County will be joining Marin Clean Energy in the spring of 2018 and Kensington Green is asking the Fire District to opt-up to 100% renewable energy which costs a little more (about \$50 a month according to Kensington Green's analysis or 4.58%). Nagel commented that the dollar amount is dependent upon usage. Navellier affirmed and explained that the public safety building only has one meter and the costs are split with the KPPCSD. Rachelle Sherris-Watt reported that KPPCSD voted to Opt-Up to MCE's 100% renewable electric for the Kensington Community Center. She said that the Board of Supervisors has decided upon using MCE for the entire County. MCE has an option to opt-up to 100% renewable energy. KPPCSD voted for the 100% option because they thought that reflected the community's values of environmentalism. The community center will only cost about \$5 extra a month. Director Kosel made a motion to table the item until the January meeting when the Kensington Green representative can attend. Director de Ville seconded the motion. Chief Maples noted the 12 month analysis included in the packet. El Cerrito has been using MCE for the past three years.

Navellier will contact the contractor.

<u>CSDA</u>: Director Nagel reported he will not be able to attend the CSDA meeting in January but is hoping Director Harmon can fill in for him. Chief Maples pointed out that Director Kosel has again been appointed to serve on CSDA's Member Services Committee and Professional Development Committee at the state level.

<u>DFSC:</u> Director Nagel reported that the Council is trying to figure out what to do without a grant and they are looking at alternative funding.

<u>Correspondence</u>: The department received lots of correspondence from Sonoma County and specifically Santa Rosa regarding the assistance that was provided during the October fires.


**Incident Activity Reports for the Month of December 2017** 

There were 35 incidents that occurred during the month of December in the community of Kensington. This is a slight increase from last month due primarily to increased awareness of the fire danger and an increased in calls from concerned citizens. Please see the attached "Incident Log" for the dates, times, locations and incident type for these calls. Summary breakdowns of these calls are shown in the charts at the bottom of this page.

During this month, Engine 65 responded to a total of 56 calls in all districts. While there were no fires with any property loss, there was a small vegetation fire behind the library where a discarded cigarette ignited some dry grass and railroad ties used as steps that was extinguished quickly with little damage.

The chart below is broken down into NFIRS incident types. The following is a list of the response types, the number of responses for each type and the percentage of the total calls for each type.

### CERT 2017 Update

In 2017, the El Cerrito-Kensington CERT Program continued steady program growth. Throughout the year we had strong attendance in all our classes and Boot Camps. With the wildfires in the Wine Country we saw a definite increase in the interest of CERT. Immediately following that disaster we held our scheduled fall Boot Camp where we had to increase the attendance limit. It is our goal to instruct 25 students in each class, however with that particular class the demand was such that we increased the limit and had 33 students.

We continued our relationship with our West County CERT neighbors in San Pablo and Richmond. This partnership continues to produce high-quality spring and fall final exercises with Department members playing key roles in coordination and instruction. Student feedback following both exercises was very positive, and all participating students expressed their gratitude towards us for producing such high-quality training. The partnership continues to be a very effective model for producing an effective training experience for our participants.

Our community participation in the El Cerrito-Kensington CERT Program continues to grow. As discussed above, we have seen a large increased interest in the program following the large wildland season in 2017 and the devastation it left behind. We have not only had an increase in participation in CERT but the request for community awareness meetings and disaster preparedness discussions as well. It has become a very time-intensive mission providing both a high-quality CERT program and meeting the increased awareness needs of a very fire safety conscious community. Although very time intensive, this is a job we take very seriously and are extremely proud of.

We continued our work with the CERT Area Program by working closely with the Area Coordinators in our 17 CERT areas in El Cerrito and Kensington. During the year we lost some of our Area Coordinators due to various reasons, but we were able to find volunteer replacements to continue the work in each area except one. These CERT Area's will play a critical role in our response and recovery in a disaster by providing immediate care following the disaster, transmitting information to the EOC and short-term sheltering neighbors. The Kensington Fire Protection District expanded their support of the six Areas in Kensington by providing funding for Area equipment caches that provide a significant number of tools and equipment for the Area's to utilize. The City of El Cerrito increased the fire budget for CERT specific printed

materials and mailings. One of the mailings was a post card that was sent to every address explaining CERT and how to join as well as directing them to the City website for class scheduling, times and locations. This has generated additional interest in the program and proven to be a very valuable method of communication. There were nearly 1,300 new personal contacts made at street fairs, community and centennial events. This accomplishment was greatly due to the work and coordination of Marlene Keller an Area Coordinator for El Cerrito Area 2. We look forward to nearly doubling that number in 2018.

We are looking at an extremely busy year in 2018 as we continue to present both the full and boot camp classes, and provide drills. ### Kensington Green

December 4, 2017

Synopsis: When Contra Costa County joins Marin Clean Energy in early 2018, the opportunity to have our electric power procured from 100% renewable, green sources is coming to all in Kensington. At the request of Kensington Green, a group made up of Kensington residents, the KPPCSD Board voted unanimously to enroll the Kensington Community Building in Marin Clean Energy's 100% renewable electric power choice. We write now to ask that the KFPD enroll the Public Safety Building in Marin Clean Energy's 100% renewable electric power choice. The cost to go 100% renewable would add approximately 4.6% to the electric bill for the Public Safety Building and would reduce the building's carbon footprint by approximately 8 tons/year.

Dear Directors of the Kensington Fire Protection District Board,

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) states that the warming of the atmosphere and ocean system is unequivocal, that many of the associated impacts such as sea level change (among other metrics) have occurred since 1950 at rates unprecedented in the historical record, that it is extremely likely (95-100% probability) that human influence has been the dominant cause of observed warming since 1950, and that the most significant driver is the increase in CO<sub>2</sub>'s atmospheric concentration.

In early 2018 we have an opportunity in Kensington to reduce significantly the amount of CO<sub>2</sub> and other greenhouse gases that are emitted into the atmosphere through the production of the electricity that we consume. Our district, along with the rest of Contra Costa County, will be joining Marin Clean Energy (MCE) in April 2018. MCE procures electrical power on behalf of the communities that it serves. The electrical power continues to be delivered and billed for by PG&E. MCE has two product choices: Light Green, which is made up of 55% renewably sourced electricity, and Deep Green, which provides electricity sourced entirely from solar and wind; 100% green and renewable with zero CO<sub>2</sub> or equivalent gases emitted. II

The Board of the Kensington Police Protection & Community Services District (KPPCSD) unanimously voted on November 16, 2017 to enroll the Kensington Community Center in MCE's Deep Green. We are writing to urge you to join the KPPCSD and pledge to enroll the Public Safety Building in MCE's 100% renewable electrical power. Taking this step would dramatically reduce the building, and our community's, carbon footprint. It would also help us in our upcoming community outreach efforts where we will be encouraging all of our residents to follow the KPPCSD and, we hope, the KFPD's lead, in going Deep Green.

### Kensington Green

The premium for opting-up for MCE's Deep Green is \$0.01/kWh. 50% of this premium is invested by MCE in local renewable generation projects, such as Solar One, a large solar installation project under construction on a brown field site in Richmond. According to the attached analysis of the past 12 months of the Public Safety Building's PG&E bills, the KFPD would have paid an additional \$568 for electricity if the Public Safety Building had been enrolled in Deep Green for these past 12 months. This is an average of \$47/month, a 4.6% increase of the Building's annual electric bill.

In terms of environmental impact, had the Public Safety Building had access to MCE's Deep Green over these past 12 months, approximately 8 tons of CO<sub>2</sub> would have been prevented from being released into the atmosphere, equivalent to removing approximately 2 cars from the road for the year.<sup>iv</sup>

We, the Kensington Green group urge you to pledge now to opt-up to MCE's Deep Green choice of 100% renewable, green electricity when it comes available in April 2018. Thank you for your consideration.
