MINUTES OF THE JULY 27, 2016 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENSINGTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

CALL TO ORDER:

President Don Dommer called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and noted the Directors that were present. Director Harmon was excused.

APPROVAL OF CONSENT ITEMS:

President Dommer called for the approval of the consent calendar (items 3, 4 & 5), consisting of approval of the June 8, 2016 minutes, acceptance of the June incident activity report, and approval of the monthly May/June 2016 financial report. Director Kosel made a motion to approve the Consent Calendar items as submitted. Director Nagel seconded the motion.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

Ciara Wood announced that three adjacent properties on Cambridge Avenue have made an application to Diablo Fire Safe Council specifically for juniper removal. She asked the Board to consider financing replanting at these properties as DFSC cannot contribute to that.

Bill Granados, President of the Contra Costa County Fire Commissioners Association introduced himself. The Commission holds quarterly meetings and the next one will be on September 22nd in the evening to which Granados invited the Board members to attend. Invitations will be forthcoming. County Fire Commissioners/Board members are all invited and the theme is "we're all in this together". What happens in different parts of the County affects everyone. Kensington appears to be well controlled and covered by El Cerrito. The goal is to interact with other districts and find out what is happening throughout the County. Fire personnel are also invited.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT:

Chief Maples reported that B/C Pigoni and Captain Castrejon are both out as strike team leaders on the Soberanes fire. The OES engine with a crew of four personnel is also out on the Soberanes fire. They left over the weekend and a crew rotation will take place over this coming weekend.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

President Dommer stated that KFPD is creating an ad-hoc committee on consolidation/dissolution. He appointed Janice Kosel and Nina Harmon to serve on that committee. They will be reviewing the LAFCO process with legal counsel's assistance. They will also seek to meet with the KPPCSD Governance Committee subcommittee on consolidation during the early fall. David Spath said the Governance Committee plans to submit their report to KPPCSD by October 1. KPPCSD will also hold a public meeting on September 15th to discuss the final drafts of their three subcommittees. Spath offered a copy of the subcommittee's draft for KFPD's review.

Dommer stated he attended CSDA Special Districts Leadership Academy earlier in the month and received good training.

Rick Artis asked what is the scope of the consolidation/dissolution committee? He asked if there will be a written work product? Kosel said the committee may or may not. They will probably hold their own public meeting to present their findings with handouts and legal counsel present. Their first charge is to review the process. Artis said the June 4th meeting slides are on KPPCSD's website. The firm of Meyers Nave represents both KFPD and the City of El Cerrito

Vanessa Cordova pointed out that while LAFCO staff reviewed the KPPCSD's consolidation subcommittee's presentation slides they did not endorse them.

NEW BUSINESS:

<u>Fire Hazard Abatement Public Hearing on the Designation of Properties Containing Fire Hazards:</u>
President Dommer opened the Public Hearing and asked if anyone in the audience had objections to the designation of their property in the process. There were no objections.

A resident who had not seen the list of properties in violation wished to nominate a property within Kensington that he feels has been a long standing hazard. The Board directed him to discuss his concerns with the Fire Prevention Officer after the formalities of the public hearing.

Fire Prevention Officer Chris Renshaw introduced himself. He gave an overview of the process. The initial list of properties in violation was 69 properties. The list is now down to six properties that are to be deemed a public nuisance. About half are below and half above Arlington Avenue. Renshaw explained the notice process. The initial letters went out on June 3rd and second notices will be sent to the six declared properties tomorrow. The third attempt is a notice on the property itself. Renshaw makes a visual inspection from the street of every property in Kensington.

A resident asked about the Carmelite Monastery at 68 Rincon Road and whether the property was inspected. He believes it to be a massive hazard. Chief Maples said the property owners have been working on the property and they received a \$5,000 Diablo Fire Safe Council grant. He encouraged the resident to speak with fire staff about his concerns.

Not hearing any objections concerning the six properties on the list, President Dommer closed the Public Hearing. Director Kosel made a motion to enact Resolution 16-06 with the updated Exhibit A that was passed out at the meeting. Director Nagel seconded the motion.

BOARD REPORTS:

<u>Finance:</u> Transmittals from the fiscal year end and earlier in July were included in the packet. The Finance Committee will present the final budget at the September meeting. The Committee will consider Ciara Wood's request made during public comment.

<u>Public Safety Building:</u> de Ville reported that the Committee and staff from both KFPD and KPPCSD met with the architectural team on 7/26/16 to discuss the current building and the departments' needs.

Education: Kosel reported that KFPD and KPPCSD have been discussing for over a year the possibility of a demonstration garden at Kensington Park. At the DFSC meeting, Kosel made contact with the Oakland demonstration garden's representative and board members from both KFPD and KPPCSDwill tour that garden. Eileen Nottoli suggested KFPD identify a few homes in Kensington that are a good example of fire safe landscaping and publicly acknowledge them. She also desires a "take back our sidewalks" campaign since many are overgrown.

CSDA: Nagel distributed a written report on the July 18, 2016 quarterly meeting. Nagel encouraged board member representation from KPPCSD to attend these meetings on a regular basis. Ironhouse Sanitary District made a presentation. The association is again sponsoring a \$1,000 scholarship for the Teacher of the Year award in Contra Costa County. LAFCO will be adopting the final municipal service review next month on the county fire agencies. Nagel reported on the efforts of the Little Hoover Commission who will be relaunching an effort on how to improve the effectiveness of special districts.

<u>Diablo Fire Safe Council:</u> Nagel attended their last meeting a week ago. Kensington is receiving about half of the grants from DFSC. Nagel gave an explanation on DFSC matching grants. B/C Bond or FPO Renshaw always attend as representatives. Renshaw said that is part of his community outreach, directing people to DFSC and possible grants. Kosel pointed out that KFPD matches resident contributions to DFSC up to \$5,000. Nagel said Alameda-Contra Costa Fire, Oakland Fire, PG&E and EBRPD all have representation on the DFSC Board also.

ADJOURNMENT: The meeting was adjourned at 7:39 p.m.





BACKGROUND

At the direction of the Board of Directors, the Fire Department has completed the abatement of one declared public nuisance located at 240 Lake Dr. The purpose of the program is to remove weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material from private properties where such flammable material endangers the public safety by creating a public nuisance and a fire hazard. Most property owners voluntarily abate these hazards without Fire Department involvement.

The property owner of the subject property identified in Exhibit A; however, failed to abate the declared fire hazards on the subject property, and the Board has followed statutory procedure to remove the hazardous conditions. The procedure is specified in the July 2016 staff report and in Resolution No. 16-06 which specifically declared the subject property by exhibit a public nuisance at the July 27, 2016 Board of Directors meeting. The subject property was declared a public nuisance following a lengthy period of repeated attempts to contact the subject property owner by mail, posting of the property, and property visits. The property owner of 240 Lake Dr. never contacted the Fire Department, nor abated the non-compliant conditions that continued to exist.

Pursuant to Health and Safety Code Section 14900 the property owner was given the opportunity to object to the subject property being designated a public nuisance. The property owner was not present at the July 8, 2015 Board of Directors meeting and never spoke in objection of the property's declaration as a public nuisance. The Board of Directors ordered the abatement of the nuisance at the subject property in Resolution No. 16-06.

The subject property was abated of the existing nuisance condition on August 19, 2016 under the supervision of the Fire Prevention Officer. Contractors from Oakland Hills Brush Clearing performed abatement clearance procedures.

Multiple notices have been sent to the subject property owner identified in Exhibit A informing them of the hearing before the Board of Directors on September 14, 2016.

AGENDA BILL: Fire Hazard Abatement September 14, 2016 Page Two

ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION

The fire hazard abatement procedure provides ample due process for the affected property owner. In the case of the subject property, due process has been far above and beyond that required by statue with an additional notice and posting ordering of abatement. Moreover, the subject property was given more than ample time to bring the property into compliance. The most important part of the procedure is that the property owner was individually given the opportunity to contest whether their property constituted a public nuisance and fire hazard at a public hearing before the Board of Directors. Again, this important component was extended to the subject property owner by allowing a hearing for existing hazards on the property. At the conclusion of the hearing on July 27, 2016, the subject property owner did not voluntarily abate the nuisance, nor produce an acceptable work plan to abate the nuisance over a period of time.

Given these unfortunate circumstances, the Board of Directors directed Fire Department staff to abate the conditions. This matter now appears before the Board of Directors for the sole purpose of confirming the abatement costs already incurred by the Kensington Fire Protection District for the subject property identified in Exhibit A. At this hearing, the Board of Directors should review the reasonableness of the costs of abatement as specified, and then determine the abatement costs to be assessed regarding the subject properties at issue. Resolution No. 16-06 provides for confirmation of the report of costs for the subject property identified in Exhibit A. Once confirmed by the Board of Directors, the costs of the abatement will be forwarded to the County Assessor for assessment on the subject property, and a lien will be recorded for the subject property with the County Recorder.

OPTION ANALYSIS

At the conclusion of the hearing, the Board of Directors may:

Option No. 1: Adopt Resolution 16-07, with Exhibit A as presented.

Option No. 2: Adopt Resolution 16-07, with Exhibit A as amended.

Option No. 3: Not adopt Resolution 16-07, thereby not confirming the report of the cost of

abatement, not forwarding the costs of abatement to the County for collection, and thereby causing the Kensington Fire Protection District to absorb the full cost of abating the hazardous conditions of the subject

property.

AGENDA BILL: Fire Hazard Abatement September 14, 2016 Page Three

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

The abatement work has been completed by contract labor and the District has paid the contractor a total of \$265.00 for their work. The administrative costs of \$916.75 include: (1) Fire Department investigation, (2) boundary determination (3) supervision of contract labor (4) preparation of documents and attend Board of Directors meetings/hearings, and (5) submittal of records/liens to the County. In order for the District to recover fully the direct and indirect costs of \$1181.75 already incurred for the abatement work performed and administrative fees, the Board of Directors should confirm the staff report on the costs of abatement at this time so that these costs can be immediately forwarded to the County for collection from the property owner.

LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS

The Kensington Fire Protection District attorney has reviewed and approved the process.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Kensington Fire Protection District Board of Directors adopt Resolution No. 16-07, with attached Exhibit B amended, as may be appropriate, based upon information received at the public hearing.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENSINGTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT CONFIRMING THE REPORT OF THE COSTS OF ABATEMENT OF PUBLIC NUISANCE CONDITIONS, WEEDS AND FLAMMABLE MATERIALS AND AUTHORIZING RELATED ACTIONS

WHEREAS, Health and Safety Code Sections 14875 et. Seq. and Government Code Sections 39560 et. Seq. provides a method by which a local legislative body may abate on private property public nuisance conditions relating to weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material which creates a fire hazard, a menace to the public health or which is otherwise noxious or dangerous; and

WHEREAS, at the conclusion of the July 27, 2016 public meeting, the Kensington Fire Protection Board of Directors directed the Fire Chief or his designee through Resolution No. 16-06, to remove the public nuisance conditions on a property deemed by the Board to constitute a public nuisance according to the provisions of Health and Safety Code Section 14900, which were and are identified at 240 Lake Dr. APN 570-232-011 ("property in question"); and

WHEREAS, the Kensington Fire Protection District Board of Directors further directed that the Fire Chief or his designee keep an account of the cost of abatement of the property in question on which work was performed in accordance with Health and Safety Code Section 14905. The report shall be prepared and presented to the Board of Directors so that, after notice and hearing, these abatement costs could be confirmed as a special assessment on the property in question; and

WHEREAS, as required by Health and Safety Code Section 14910 and Government Code Section 39576, the Kensington Fire Protection District Board of Directors conducted a hearing on September 14, 2016 at which objections were heard regarding the report and the assessment of the abatement costs for the property identified in Exhibit A of this Resolution. Notice of the hearing was provided to the owner of the subject property; and

WHEREAS, at the hearing, Fire Department staff presented evidence for the subject property for which there were no objections concerning the abatement costs and administrative expenses contained in the report; and

WHEREAS, such testimony included a description of the public nuisance conditions which existed at the property prior to abatement, a description of the services required to abate those conditions, the staff and machinery necessary to achieve abatement, the costs to the District in abating those conditions, and such other matter deemed relevant by the Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, the Kensington Fire Protection District Board of Directors does hereby conclude that the abatement costs for the property in question identified in Exhibit A, as such costs may have been modified by the Board of Directors after a review of the evidence, are fair and reasonable. This determination is based on the evidence submitted by the property owner, the evidence submitted by Fire Department staff, the evidence concerning the nuisance conditions which existed on the property

in question prior to abatement, the evidence concerning the scope of services required to abate those conditions, and such other matter deemed relevant by the Board of Directors.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Kensington Fire Protection District Board of Directors does hereby confirm the report of costs of abatement as contained in Exhibit B of this Resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the costs of abatement shall be levied as a special assessment against the property in question and that these costs shall be certified to the auditor of Contra Costa County so that the costs of abatement shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner as ordinary county taxes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this Resolution confirming the abatement costs for the property in question identified in Exhibit A of this Resolution shall be immediately filed with the County Auditor.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Fire Chief or designee shall take such action necessary to record the abatement costs for the property in question as identified in Exhibit A of this Resolution with the County Recorder as a lien against the property in question provided for in Health and Safety Code Section 14912.

Are You Prepared for the Threat of Wildfire?



The State of California is now in its fifth year of drought conditions, drying out large swaths of undeveloped land.

Wildfires have burned throughout the summer in both northern and southern California consuming thousands of acres, hundreds of homes, and displacing many residents of the affected areas.

Living in Kensington is living in the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI). Nearly all of Kensington is designated by Cal Fire as a Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone.

What can you do to protect your home and family? Be prepared!

First, ensure that your home has defensible space around it. The buffer zone that you create by removing weeds, brush, and overgrown vegetation helps to keep the fire away from your home and reduces the risk of flying embers. Defensible space is essential for structure survivability during wildland fire conditions. For a guideline on clearing around your home, see our

website at www.kensingtonfire.org/ safety/index.shtml. You can also download the full fire hazard reduction guidelines, as adopted by our Board of Directors.

Second, be sure to prepare your home itself. Re-roof with fire resistant materials and clear all debris from gutters. Make sure any tree branches are not within 10 feet of your roof. Keep your deck or patio, and the area below it, clear of all combustible items and consider screening or enclosing raingutters.

Third, know your evacuation routes. While there may not be a way to predict which direction a fire will come from ahead of time, you should know and practice several ways to exit your neighborhood.

There will be light refreshments served.




Get Ready with CERT Boot Camp

Addresses covered by paint and shrubbery are hard to see. Night and weather conditions may affect their visibility also. Many obstacles can make identifying one home from the next time consuming-when seconds are critical! Also, let's not forget your local

personnel, mailman, UPS drivers, friends, and rela-

A couple of helpful hints: on mailboxes, numbers should be three to four inches in height and should be located on both sides of the mailbox. Fire, police, and medical units may arrive from either direction. House numbers should be from four to six inches in height and easily visible at night. Also, for multiple homes located on a single driveway, the numbers should be posted at the beginning of the driveway and be clearly visible on the homes. For homes you can't see from the street, numbers should also be on a post located at the driveway leading directly to your home. Help us, help you!
