CALL TO ORDER:

President Ramsey called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. and noted that all Directors and the Fire Chief were present. District Administrator, Brenda Navellier, was excused.

APPROVAL OF CONSENT ITEMS:

President Ramsey called for approval of the consent calendar (items 3, 4, 5 & 6) consisting of the March 10, 2010 minutes, the acceptance of the March incident activity report, the monthly A/P voucher #11, and the March/April 2010 monthly financial report. Director Ramsey asked for the following corrections to the March 10, 2010 minutes: Page 2, President's Report, change "and" to "had" following "....Ramsey" on the first line; Page 3, Board Reports, fifth line, insert "engineer" following "civil". Michael made a motion to accept consent calendar item 3 as corrected, and items 4, 5, and 6 as submitted. Director Blaschczyk seconded the motion.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT:

Chief Maples reported that the department held its CERT simulation drill on Saturday, August 24th. It was a joint drill with Richmond, San Pablo, and Pinole. Approximately 150 people participated in the drill.

On May 8th, Engine 65 attended the annual Hilltop Carnival. The District-sponsored Polaroid pictures are a huge hit with the children and their families. Firefighters take pictures of the kids sitting in the engine which they get to take home immediately.

Also, on May 8th, the department held a CERT boot camp at Building E. Director Ramsey attended and gave the Fire Chief feedback from her experience in the class. Also two KPPCSD Board members attended. The District received an appreciation letter from KCC for the remodel donation that KFPD made.

Chief Maples reported that he attended the Fire Districts Association annual conference last week and received KFPD's final resolution from the State of California for being the second fire district in California to become a District of Distinction. Maples presented the resolution to the Board. Maples acknowledged Director Kosel for her idea to pursue the recognition.

Chief Maples announced that former El Cerrito Chief Cutright's retirement will take place on May 18th. Some of the current Board members worked with Chief Cutright who is the current Chief of Emeryville.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

President Ramsey reported that she and some of the other Directors attended the May 1, 2010 Kensington Property Owners Association meeting. There were four items on the ambitious agenda and Ramsey had to remind KPOA that she was invited to be a speaker. LAFCO's representative discussed everything from Kensington's sphere of influence under El Cerrito, to being annexed to El Cerrito, to consolidation and elections. Ramsey stated at the meeting that the KFPD Board is not persuaded that consolidation is a positive thing and consolidation would be a detriment to fire services.

Ramsey attended the May 8, 2010 CERT Boot Camp training at the community center. She stated she has been through lots and lots of training in her previous government position, but this was one of the best and she commended Chief Maples on his training staff. She was impressed with the information that was condensed into a one-day format from the 20-hour training. Ramsey reported that both KPPCSD President Toombs and Director Stein stated that the training gave them both a real understanding of emergency services.

BOARD REPORTS:

<u>Finance Committee:</u> Kosel reported that the Committee would meet later in the month and would take a first run at the FY 10-11 budget, updating the District's five year projection, and calculating if any contribution should be made to the CalPERS Trust in FY 10-11.

Property Management: Dommer reported that the District has completed the Public Works process, has obtained an Encroachment Permit and is currently proceeding with Plan Check through the Building Department. After the District receives the Building Department's comments, the architect will incorporate their comments. Dommer estimates the project will bid later this month. Legal counsel is currently reviewing the contractor's contract and whether to use an AIA form or some other. Contractors were previously prequalified for the project. Dommer said that he and the architect did an estimate, and the construction firm also did an estimate and both were within \$5,000 of each other. Total construction is estimated at \$365,000 on top of any funds expended to date. Dommer said that Public Works/Encroachment has taken six months and approximately \$25,000 in extra fees.

Education: Kosel reported that the District had a very successful pharmaceutical drop-off last month. Nine containers were filled with pharmaceutical waste. Running the program every six months is working out quite well. B/C Bond will be making a disaster preparedness presentation at Arlington Community Church on June 10, 2010.

Dommer said he has met with the presenters for the Earthquake Building Damage Forum, Navellier has created a flyer, there was brief mention of the event in the Outlook, Ramsey has distributed flyers to businesses, etc. Ramsey also obtained the sign board and the sign board next to the library which is an exception. Ramsey suggested a sign-up sheet for attendees acknowledging that KFPD does not endorse the presenters. Dommer said he would make that clear in his introductions/announcements. B/C Pigoni will arrive early to help set-up.

Emergency Preparedness: The Committee will meet again in July.

Contra Costa County Special Districts Association: Ramsey, Blaschczyk and Navellier attended the April 19, 2010 meeting. The presenter was the Executive Director of the Contra Costa Mayor's Conference and talked about the State-wide budget outlook. The projected State deficit is approximately 20 to 25% of the entire budget. The presenter discussed political stalemates, fixed costs, the need to look for new revenue, etc. Helmut also noted that the latest numbers from the State Treasurer's office show they felt short by about \$2 billion dollars of what they expected to collect in revenue. Possibly the State would come back to local government for more "borrowing". Kosel noted that the County Board of Supervisors adopted their budget yesterday of which there was very little discretion. The County is now starting to fund retiree benefits and anticipate to be funded by 2041. Helmut noted that Dwight Meadows and George Schmidt were both re-elected to the LAFCO Board. KFPD cast their vote for the Board member from Moraga-Orinda Fire.

MINUTES OF THE JUNE 9, 2010 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENSINGTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

CALL TO ORDER:

President Ramsey called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. and noted that all Directors were present. Honored guest El Cerrito City Manager Scott Hanin was also present.

APPROVAL OF CONSENT ITEMS:

President Ramsey called for approval of the consent calendar (items 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 & 9) consisting of the April 14, 2010 minutes, acceptance of the April incident activity report, acceptance of the May incident activity report, the monthly A/P voucher #12, the April/May 2010 monthly financial report, Resolution 10-01 establishing the appropriations limit for FY10-11, and Resolution 10-02 ordering even year Board of Directors elections; consolidation of elections; and specifications of the election order. Director Kosel made a motion to approve the adoption of the consent calendar. Director Michael seconded the motion.

President Ramsey moved the agenda to item 12, presentation of El Cerrito Contract Fee in recognition of Hanin's attendance.

NEW BUSINESS:

El Cerrito Contract Fee Proposal for FY2010-2011: Scott Hanin said he had made his City budget presentation to the El Cerrito Council two days prior. Hanin noted that many of the surrounding communities have enacted or announced layoffs including Pinole, Richmond, and Berkeley. The City of Pittsburgh's staff is down 45% and Concord's finances are totally upside down. Berkeley is closing its pool; San Jose is laying off policemen and closing fire stations. El Cerrito was the fifth lowest in the Bay Area in terms of foreclosures and the absolute lowest in Contra Costa County. There have still been significant drops in sales tax, largely due to Target and Mitsubishi leaving the City, but the Plaza is performing as well as ever. In the last few months, sales tax has started to increase. The median household price in El Cerrito has gone up during the calendar year. The City is able to balance the budget in FY10-11 due to the fact they will use over \$500,000 in reserves and leave 13 personnel spots (roughly 10% of staff) vacant. Two of those vacancies are in the fire department. The City has gone to all of its bargaining groups and asked them to defer or not take any raises this year. So far, all responses have been positive. The City is considering placing a 7-year sales tax measure on the November ballot. Polling last fall and last month indicate that the measure would pass. A large Safeway will be built on the former Target site at Del Norte. By the end of next year, 70% of the streets in El Cerrito will have been repaved from the sales tax measure that was passed to address this issue. Currently the City is one year ahead of its schedule for paving. The City is also making improvements to San Pablo Avenue street light poles, median strips, street trees and rain gardens. Between all departments the City has received \$15 million in grants and Federal monies during the past five years. Staff has been creative and aggressive in finding ways to improve the City. Revenues are going up only slightly; expenses in all departments are flat or down. There have been minimal impacts on the fire department. There are no layoffs considered in FY10-11.

Discussion followed on government pension plans and the pension bashing in the Contra Costa Times. Hanin believes government will be forced into a second tier approach. El Cerrito already does not pay retiree medical which helps to keep it financially viable. PERS rates, 3% at 50, pension costs and employee retention/median pay were discussed in generalities. El Cerrito hired a consultant to analyze the property tax rolls and is projecting property tax revenue as flat.

Director Kosel noted that KFPD has either fully funded its retiree obligation or they may have to make one last \$50,000 contribution in the next fiscal year. The District is waiting for a current actuarial valuation to be completed. The Board will be deciding whether to impose the special tax this year later in the agenda. Even with the special tax, KFPD will be running a deficit this year but still has healthy reserves. KFPD is not yet able to put aside an entire year's worth of contract fee per the contract with El Cerrito.

Hanin said that project bids are coming in much lower due to the economy. Overall the City's budget is extremely lean and he does not believe KFPD can get any better service from another fire department, particularly since Maples has become Chief.

Maples gave an overview of the Fire Department's section of the overall City budget. The department is broken into four sections, there are actually three vacancies in the department – two firefighters and one secretary, which Navellier is filling part-time via the contract amendment. The emergency response workload listed is for the entire department. The average response time department-wide is 4 minutes and 15 seconds; in Kensington specifically it is 5 minutes and 8 seconds. The increased time is due to the hills and tighter, curvy streets in Kensington. The response time has dropped a little in the last two years and is down 37 seconds from the previous year. The County and National standard is 6 minutes. Maples also noted the fire loss statistics, training hours, amount of inspections and amount of certifications. All certifications listed, besides EMT, are outside training that staff is attending. Maples then reviewed the department's accomplishments including the design, specification and purchase of a new Type I for Station 72. Last year, the department purchased a new Type III engine for Station 72. The overall condition of the fleet combined with Kensington's has never been in better shape. Maples discussed the life span of the engines. The Vial of Life program appears to be successful—the public has been asking for them and the engine companies are starting to see them on refrigerators. The department has just implemented a Health & Wellness program for the firefighters that includes an annual physical, treadmill stress, EKG, hearing, vision, blood panel, etc. It took almost 18 months to work through the details with the labor group to adopt the program. Under department goals and objectives, first is a high level of customer service and second to continue the rigorous training program. Maples will keep a close watch on both and on the mutual-aid agreements in these financially challenging times. ECFD has to make sure other departments that aren't doing as well don't put undue burden on them. As part of goals, the department wants to continue with its community outreach programs – first aid, CPR, etc.—operational activities like CERT, its excellent relationship with Diablo Fire Safe Council and the on-going vegetation management reduction program. Maintenance, certification and testing of equipment is a very large job and another area that staff has to keep a close eye on during tight financial times. Retaining personnel could be a challenge in upcoming years. There are still some public agencies that are giving their employees substantial raises though none in the immediate surrounding areas.

Maples noted that the projected number in the financials reflects the 2% raise that the firefighters are due by contractual agreement for FY10-11. However, after preliminary meetings, Maples is fairly comfortable that number will be lowered after the union votes on the issue. Overtime is increased by 46% due to the two firefighter vacancies. Depending on the rank, there is a 9 to 13% savings compared to filling a vacancy. All other budget numbers are flat. Vehicle equipment maintenance has been at \$80,000 for three years. Maples noted the new fee line item that lists "total compensation cost share" or ½ of the cost of Navellier's salary which reduces the fee plus there is a \$37,000 reconciliation this year. The proposed contract fee is \$2,087,423.37 or 28.4% of the total fire budget and 1.5% less than FY09-10.

Director Kosel noted that Maples had prepared a list of costs per fire station including many of the surrounding jurisdictions. Kensington's cost of the ECFD budget is far below the cost of running a single station. Maples agreed that running three stations is far more cost effective than running a one or two station system.

Joan Gallegos asked the status of the reservoir. Maples said it is moving ahead and EBMUD is still having meetings. Maples has utmost faith in Jose Rios, EBMUD's planning engineer, and Rios has confidence in the project. Nikki Kaiser asked if KFPD has recently looked at installing large tanks of potable water along the ridge. Director Kosel suggested Kaiser contact former Director Gil Bendix to learn about cisterns. There are many issues involved including soil issues, slides, earthquake breakage, neighborhood concerns, etc. Director Michael made a motion to accept the El Cerrito contract fee for FY10-11 as submitted. Director Dommer seconded the motion.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

Nikki Kaiser commented that she attended the brush clearing event at park interface that was coordinated by Ciara Woods. Kaiser said there was moderate attendance and suggested that CERT attendees and block captains could also participate. Maples said that was the third such event this year which may explain the waning interest.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT:

Chief Maples reported that the National Seasonal Assessment workshops took place earlier in the year to forecast fire season. Northern California has received anywhere from 89 to 120% of its precipitation this past year. Some of the spring showers will boost the vegetation growth in the lower elevations. In spite of recent rain, there is still lots of vegetation that is stressed from the preceding drought and have fallen victim to disease and insects. That

vegetation will increase the fire risk. California is continuing to have wide-spread dry lightning storms. Overall, California's fire season will be average.

Nikki Kaiser commented that not all Kensington residents live along the interface and many of the lots are quite small and close together, separated by a wooden fence. Possibly different information/training could be produced for those residents in small lots also.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

President Ramsey reported on Administrator Navellier's annual evaluation. Ramsey said that the Board unanimously agreed that Navellier does an outstanding job. KFPD is more than pleased with Navellier's performance. Ramsey said that Navellier is a "go to" person and gets along well with other people, especially difficult ones. Ramsey said the District is grateful to have Navellier as an employee. Maples added that Navellier is the voice of KFPD and ECFD. He said El Cerrito got a good deal with the employee share. Ramsey said she never hears complaints about Navellier.

Ramsey said she has been approached individually by three different KCC Directors to inform her that the remodel of the community center has been postponed indefinitely and KCC would be returning KFPD's donation. Ramsey said she is certainly open to a future plea for a donation for this cause. Joan Gallegos added that KCC reached a roadblock with KPPCSD and the current agreement on how they operate. KPPCSD says they have been advised by their legal counsel that if KCC is permitted to make the planned renovations at the community center, they need to be a tenant with a formal rental agreement at fair market value. The current arrangement is for KCC to operate as an agent of KPPCSD to provide programs. Kaiser observed that this is the same agency that didn't want to pay fair market value to use the Fire District's building. Negotiations are currently stalled. Also, County Health is requiring major changes/expenses to the kitchen if it is remodeled. The current agreement for KCC to operate as an agent has been in place for many years.

NEW BUSINESS CONTINUED:

Consulting Agreement with Macks Craic, Inc. (dba Mack5): Director Dommer said both he and the attorney reviewed the agreement. The agreement would be the vehicle to tie the next work order to. Director Dommer made a motion to accept Mack5's consulting agreement as submitted. Director Michael seconded the motion. Dommer clarified any future cost increases proposed by Mack5 would be brought to the Board.

Administrator's Salary Adjustment for FY10-11: President Ramsey noted that the District would like to offer the Administrator a modest 2% salary increase beginning with fiscal year 2010-11 and also a 10% increase to medical reimbursement which would equate to the Kaiser rate for an individual of Navellier's age (approximately \$45 per month). Kosel explained that the medical reimbursement is functionally a cafeteria plan and the amount is taxable. Director Blaschczyk made a motion to approve a 2% salary increase and the stated 10% medical reimbursement increase for the Administrator beginning in FY10-11. Director Dommer seconded the motion.

Auditor Recommendation and Fee Proposal for FY09-10 Audit Report: Director Kosel reported that KFPD had been using the same auditor for the last few years; there is a relatively small pool of local government auditors. Both Navellier and District CPA, Russell, give Lamorena & Chang good reviews and the Finance Committee is well pleased with their user friendly audit report. The Finance Committee recommends signing the contract and is pleased to report that there was no increase in fee from the previous year. Director Kosel made a motion to engage Lamorena & Chang for \$12,000. Director Dommer seconded the motion.

Resolution 10-03 Authorizing the County to Place the District's Special Tax on the Tax Roll and to Collect the Special Tax for FY10-11: Director Ramsey said that the Finance Committee did not make a recommendation on this issue, deferring to the entire Board's discussion and decision. The Board decided by consensus to have a budget discussion prior to discussing the special tax. Ramsey moved the item to agenda 17-Preliminary Budget.

Resolution 10-04 Adopting the Preliminary Revenue, Operating Expense, and Capital Improvement Budget for FY10-11: Director Kosel reviewed the draft budget that is proposed by the Finance Committee and included in the packet. The Board always adopts its draft budget in June and formally enacts the final in September. Estimated construction costs and fees are currently listed at a total of \$515,000. Hopefully, the bid will come in lower reflecting the current economy. The District originally thought the project would take place in FY09-10 but it has gone much slower than anticipated and has increased in scope. Bid numbers should be in place for the September final budget. Kosel also reminded the Board that the District usually solicits the Fire Chief for any budget items that he would like to request. Maples will confer with his command staff and that presentation will take place in August this year in advance of the final budget in September.

Under the Revenue budget, the District is projecting flat property tax revenue which is consummate with El Cerrito's projection. A brief discussion on foreclosures in Kensington ensued. Kosel emphasized that the Finance Committee does not have utmost faith in the Revenue projection and it is a huge factor to apply percentages to when considering a five-year projection. The special tax is included in the initial budget following the Board's previous decision to suspend it for one year. Interest income was budgeted at \$50,000 for FY09-10 but the District only received about 1/3 of that. This is due to the economy and current interest rates, and also the amount of funding the District has put into the CalPERS Trust which is making very good interest. The lease agreement with the contract required increase is included and the salary reimbursement agreement listed is El Cerrito's payment of one-half of Navellier's total compensation. Net operating Revenue is approximately \$3 million.

Under Expenses, the actual number for the El Cerrito contract fee is listed which comes out to a decrease over the previous year, water system improvements is budgeted at \$20,000 for opportunistic hydrants when EBMUD is working in the area. There is a significant decrease in firefighter's apparel because ECFD's request last year was to enhance the firefighter's wildland gear. Kosel reviewed the Administrator's costs and pointed out that she was full time in FY09-10 for only eight months which is why there appears to be a larger increase than 2%. The District also has a \$30,000 contingency fund for unforeseen items. Total revenues are \$3.051 million and total operating expenses \$2.962 million. If the Board approves the imposition of the special tax, the District would have a positive cash flow of \$90,000 on operating expenditures only. If the Board does not approve the special tax, the District would have a \$150,000 deficit for operating expenditures only. Under Capital Expenditures, the building remodel expense is moved forward to FY10-11 and also apparatus bay doors at \$45,000. With the projected capital outlay, total expenditures are \$3.172 million which would give the District a \$120,000 deficit with the special tax or \$320,000 deficit without the special tax. Dommer pointed out that was on a cash flow basis but not according to the budget sheet. Kosel concurred. She continued to review the second page of the budget and pointed out that the State has borrowed over \$200,000 from KFPD which is theory is to be paid back next fiscal year. Kosel noted that the District has designated funds for a Type I engine, Type III engine and the building. KFPD has not gone to the voters in over 30 years to increase the special tax partly due to the fact that the District saves for large expenditures. The building schedule is built off of the last kitchen remodel/office expansion and does not take into account the major seismic renovations that have been done. The Finance Committee is trying to put together a schedule that averages the amount the District has spent per year on the building since the inception of the El Cerrito contract which is what freed up money to address deferred maintenance. The District only has QuickBook numbers from 2000 forward so staff will have to dig through old audits. Kosel said it is matter of finding time to prepare the schedule and it most likely will not be prepared in time for the final budget in September. Dommer and Kosel agreed the average is probably \$80-100,000 per year. The other item listed under Designed Funds is the prefunding of the retirees benefits. KFPD's next actuarial study will be complete later this summer. At this time, the actuary is estimating that KFPD has a very small or no further contribution to make to the Trust and that the District should start paying for benefits out of the Trust in FY11-12. KFPD has an extremely small pool of retirees and the District cannot have any overfunding returned until the last retiree is gone. FY09-10 starts out with \$3.7 M of reserves and \$3.6M in FY10-11. KFPD has not been able to fully fund the El Cerrito contact. Further discussion followed on the Ending Cash numbers. Kosel praised Navellier and Russell for their preparation of the draft budget. Part of the building remodel costs are in the designated funds. The Board needs to decide what the reserves are for and how flush is the District to have a discussion on the Special Tax.

Ramsey moved the agenda back to Item 16 - Resolution 10-03 Authorizing the County to Place the District's Special Tax on the Tax Roll and to Collect the Special Tax for FY10-11 CONT: The Board reviewed the two five-year projections that were included in the packet. The Finance Committee emphasized they did not have a crystal ball and these were possible projections not to be construed as accurate. Kosel explained the escalator percent in the margins of the property tax revenue. The other major percentage that the Committee cannot know predict is the El Cerrito contract fee. The last two years have been very minimal increases, so the Committee put in 8% for FY11-12. Past percentages go up and down roughly every other year, but that may not be the pattern for the immediate future during the current economic times. Further discussion followed on economic trends, inflation, deflation, property tax revenues, etc. Dommer suggested that a graphic chart would be easier for him to follow. Board rehashed the numbers discussed under the budget. Kosel said it is up to each Board member to decide

whether imposing or not imposing the tax is the most prudent financial management. Further clarifications followed on the budget. Dommer said he did not have strong feelings about placing the tax either way. He did think if the District didn't take it for several years, the District would get a bad reaction instead of positive because people will have forgotten about it. Kosel's inclination is to take the special tax again this year since the District is running a cash flow deficit. KFPD was actually critiqued in letters to the editor of the Outlook for not imposing the tax when there was a projected deficit with the building project. The Board talked about the El Cerrito contract set-aside and Maples added that it is a huge morale booster for the employees. Blaschczyk made a motion to place the special tax on the tax roll and to collect the special tax for FY10-11. Director Ramsey agreed that she is persuaded. Director Michael seconded the motion.

Director Michael seconded the motion.

<u>Finance Committee:</u> The minutes from January 2010 were included in the packet. The next meeting will be prior to the September meeting.

Property Management: Dommer reported that the District has received comments back from the Plan Check. The Architect is working with the County to address those issues and resubmitted drawings a few days ago. The architect will largely be done with his work after this. The project should go out to bid within the next week or so with or without the County's final approval. Dommer said the architect has had the drawings done since last August and the project has been hung up for months because of the County process which has also added to the fee costs. The District will probably receive bids in July, Mack5 will need several days to review the bids and the Board should receive approval for the bidder in August.

Education: B/C Bond will be making a disaster preparedness presentation at Arlington Community Church on June 10, 2010. Engine 65 will also do a presentation for any children that attend. Discussion followed on The Outlook mix-up of this presentation with the May seismic forum.

Contra Costa County Special Districts Association: Next meeting will be in July.

<u>Correspondence:</u> The District received a very nice thank you letter from two elderly ladies that the engine company assisted.

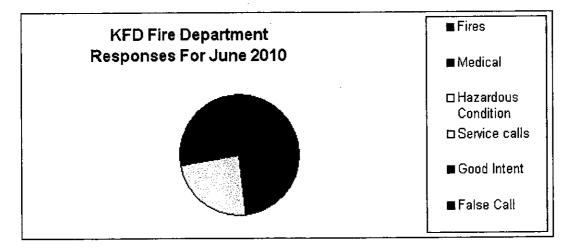

Annual Fire Hazard Abatement

BACKGROUND

The fire department is continuing its annual fire hazard abatement program. This program seeks to remove weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material from private properties where such flammable material endangers the public safety by creating a public nuisance and a fire hazard. Most property owners voluntarily abate these hazards without Fire Department involvement. Ideally 100% of the property owners would do so. Experience in prior years suggests most will comply. Any property owners that do not comply will have the District do the work and place the costs on their tax bill.

ANALYSIS/DISCUSSION

The Fire Hazard Abatement process under the direction of the Fire Department should proceed according to Health and Safety Code Sections 14875 et seq which specify the following:

- 1. The El Cerrito Fire Department on behalf of the Kensington Fire Protection District has determined hazards that must be abated. Pursuant to these code sections, hazards are defined as weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable materials which create a fire hazard or are otherwise noxious or dangerous and which exist on specific parcels of property within the boundaries of the District.
- 2. Notice was sent by mail that the Fire District has determined the existence of a public nuisance which must be abated and that a hearing will be held to consider any objections prior to ordering the Fire Chief or his designee to perform abatement.
- 3. At the August 11, 2010 meeting, the Board of Directors shall hear and consider all objections to the proposed removal of weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Board of Directors shall by resolution allow or overrule any objections and order the Fire Chief or his designee to abate some or all of the public nuisance conditions on any remaining parcels which have not been voluntarily cleared by that time. The costs for abatement shall be assessed against the property as a lien and special assessment.
- 4. At the conclusion of the August 11, 2010 hearing a second and final notice shall be sent to each property owner prior to abatement. This notice will order the immediate abatement of nuisance conditions. This notice will clearly state that if nuisance conditions are ignored, the

Fire District shall cause abatement and costs for removal will be assessed against the property as a lien and special assessment. It will also indicate that if the conditions are voluntarily abated, the property shall be removed from the process.

- 5. Sometime between August 30, 2010 and September 15, 2010, if the hazardous conditions are not removed prior to the arrival of the hazard abatement crew, the Kensington Fire Protection District shall cause the weeds, rubbish, refuse, and other flammable material to be removed and shall keep an account of the cost of abatement for each parcel or land where such work is performed.
- 6. After September 30, 2010, the Fire Chief or his designee shall submit to the Board of Directors of the Fire District for confirmation an itemized written report showing the cost of abatement work performed. A copy of this report shall be posted for at least three days prior to its submission to the Board of Directors. Each property owner upon whose property abatement work was performed shall be sent written notice by mail of a hearing by the Board of Directors to consider the cost of abatement work performed on their property.
- 7. At the Board meeting on October 13, 2010 the Board of Directors of the Fire District shall receive and consider the written staff report on abatement actions taken by the District and shall hear any objections from the property owners liable to be assessed for the abatement. The Board of Directors may modify the staff report if deemed appropriate and then confirm the report by motion or resolution.
- 8. After Board of Directors confirmation of the report, a certified copy of the report shall be filed with the county auditor who shall add the amount of the assessment to the next regular tax bill levied against the parcel.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

The abatement program will be administered by Fire Department staff with minimum costs expended for printing and mailing. Abatement work will be completed by private contract labor as appropriate. Program costs will be recovered through the special assessment and lien process.

LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS

The Fire District's Attorney has reviewed and approved the process.

The Fire Hazard Abatement Program is exempt from California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to sections 15304 and 15308 or the CEQA Guidelines. Therefore, no further CEQA review is required.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Kensington Fire Protection District authorize through the adoption of Resolution the initiation of the abatement process by declaring weeds, rubbish, litter, and other flammable material on specific parcels of property within District boundaries as public nuisances, which must be abated.

RESOLUTION 10-05

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENSINGTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT DECLARING THAT WEEDS, RUBBISH, LITTER OR OTHER FLAMMABLE MATERIAL ON DESIGNATED PRIVATE PROPERTIES CONSTITUTES A PUBLIC NUISANCE AND PROVIDING FOR NOTICE THAT THE FIRE CHIEF OR DESIGNEE SHALL ABATE SUCH PUBLIC NUISANCE CONDITIONS IF NOT ABATED BY THE PROPERTY OWNER.

WHEREAS, Health and Safety Code Sections 14875 et seq provides a method by which a local legislative body may abate on private property public nuisance conditions relating to weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material which creates a fire hazard, a menace to the public health or which is otherwise noxious or dangerous; and

WHEREAS, the Fire Marshal for the Kensington Fire Protection District has identified in Exhibit A to this resolution those private properties, by street name, lot and block number, on which the presence of weeds, as defined in Health and Safety Code Section 14875, constitute a public nuisance; and

WHEREAS, Health and Safety Code Sections 14890 through 14899 provide that notice shall be provided to each person to whom the properties identified in Exhibit A is assessed informing those persons that unless the property owner abates those nuisance conditions, that the Fire District shall abate the public nuisance. The notice shall further state that if the Fire District must abate the public nuisance, then the cost of abatement shall be assessed against the property as a special assessment. The notice shall also specify a date for a hearing at which property owners may present objections to the designation of their properties as public nuisances or to the proposed removal of the weeds by the Fire District; and

WHEREAS, Health and Safety Code Section 14900 provides that after the hearing, the local legislative body may, by motion or resolution, order the Fire Chief or designee to abate the public nuisance. After further proceedings, these abatement costs may be assessed against the property as a special assessment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Kensington Fire Protection District that the properties listed in Exhibit A to this resolution are declared a public nuisance and such nuisance conditions shall be ordered abated because the presence of weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material on those properties create a fire hazard, a menace to the public health or are otherwise noxious or dangerous.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the notice shall state that a public hearing shall be held on October 13, 2010 at 7:30 p.m. at the Kensington Community Center located at 59 Arlington Avenue, Kensington, California. At this hearing, the Board shall receive a written staff report on abatement actions and any objections shall be heard from the property owners identified in Exhibit A liable to be assessed for the abatement.

Dear Kensington Property Owner:

We are approaching the season of our highest fire danger when the grass, weeds, refuse, brush and other vegetation dry out and become highly flammable. After a fairly dry winter and a wet spring, the grass and brush are abundant and will create a severe fire hazard. To reduce the fire danger on private property, the Fire District is beginning its annual Fire Hazard Abatement Program. We have inspected your property and found your property does not comply with the Vegetation Management Standards set forth in the Kensington Fire Protection District Vegetation Management Standards. You are being contacted now so that you may remove those fire hazard conditions found on your property.

Beginning August 2nd the Fire District will be conducting a re-inspection of your property to evaluate if it meets our vegetation management standards. If your property meets the standards you will be removed from our list of non-compliant properties and will not be subject to further abatement actions.

Enclosed please find our legal notice explaining the District's Fire Hazard Abatement Program and advising you of the upcoming public hearing. **Please read this notice carefully.** In general, the Fire District is concerned with removing refuse, dry and/or dead vegetation that is easily ignitable and capable of burning structures and endangering lives.

The enclosed guidelines provide a general explanation of the vegetation clearing and maintenance standards to be followed. For most private lots and yards these guidelines provide straightforward instructions on what actions you, the property owner, should take to remove the fire hazards. On the other hand, certain lots and yards are more difficult to assess. If you would like your property inspected by our Fire Prevention Officer, Captain Teresa Pace, at no cost, she can identify your specific fire hazards and provide you with the information needed to meet our standards. We urge you to call the Fire Prevention Office at (510) 215-4457 with any questions about clearing or maintaining your property or to schedule an inspection.

Thank you for your cooperation in making Kensington a fire safe community.

NOTICE TO DESTROY WEEDS AND REMOVE RUBBISH, REFUSE AND OTHER FLAMMABLE MATERIAL

Notice is hereby given that on the 1st day of July, 2010, the El Cerrito Fire Department on behalf of the Kensington Fire Protection District has determined your property in the community of Kensington, designated above by address and parcel number, a public nuisance. This nuisance is caused by the presence of weeds, rubbish, litter or other flammable material which creates a fire hazard, a menace to the public health, or is otherwise noxious or dangerous.

You are hereby ordered to abate these public nuisance conditions by removing the weeds, rubbish, refuse, and other flammable material. Otherwise, the Fire District will abate these nuisance conditions and the costs for removal of the weeds, rubbish, refuse and other flammable material will be assessed against your property as a lien and special assessment. These removal costs shall then be collected in the time and in the manner of ordinary municipal taxes. Reference is hereby made to the resolution for further particulars.

If you have any objections to the designation of your property as a public nuisance or to the proposed removal of the weeds, rubbish, refuse and other flammable material from your property by the Kensington Fire Protection District, you are hereby notified of the Kensington Fire Protection District, Board of Directors Meeting and may attend this meeting to be held on August 11, 2010 at 7:30 p.m. at the Kensington Community Center located at 59 Arlington Avenue, Kensington, California. At this meeting, your objections will be heard and given due consideration.

At the conclusion of this meeting, the Board of Directors may order the Fire Chief or designee to abate the public nuisance condition on your property. The Fire District shall perform this removal directly or through private contract sometime between **August 30, 2010 and September 10, 2010**. It is impossible to predict what it will cost the Fire District to remove these nuisance conditions from your property. The costs depend on the severity of those conditions. In past years with other fire agencies these abatement costs have sometimes exceeded \$5,000 per parcel for those parcels with severe nuisance conditions.

These removal costs shall then be collected in the time and in the manner of ordinary municipal taxes.

You will not receive any further notices from the District prior to this removal. The District shall perform this removal either through its own staff or through private contract sometime between August 30, 2010 and September 15,2010. It is impossible to predict what it will cost the District to remove these nuisance conditions from your property. The costs depend on the severity of those conditions. In past years these abatement costs have sometimes exceeded \$5,000 per parcel for those parcels with severe nuisance conditions.

The Kensington Fire Protection District Board of Directors will hold a public hearing on October 13, 2010 at 7:30 p.m. at the Kensington Community Center located at 59 Arlington Avenue, Kensington, California. At this hearing, the Board will receive the staff report and cost of abatement for your property. Objections to the abatement costs can be heard at this public hearing.

Fire Hazard Reduction Program The Kensington Fire Protection District

I. INTRODUCTION

A. Purpose of Vegetation Management Standards

Along with California's growth of population and expanding development, urban housing has intermixed with wildland areas. California communities have experienced devastating fire loss because of the severity of fires which occur in this intermix area. The risk of conflagration in the intermix is increased further by homeowners who create uncontrolled landscaping of native and non-native plants on their properties. Thousands of homes are threatened by fire every year in California largely because of this heavy vegetation fuel load very near structures.

Almost the entire community of Kensington is considered to be a wildland intermix area which increases the community's risk of loss from devastating fire. This area has been identified by the California Department of Forestry (CDF) and the Kensington Fire Protection District as Very High Fire Hazard Severity (VHFHS) zone. As specified by State law (AB 337), property owners within this zone must take special precautions with their property, including vegetation management, to reduce the risk of fire.

The buildup of unmanaged vegetation, whether native or non-native, steep hillsides with canyons and draws, and periods of extremely hot, dry weather all combine to create in Kensington the potential for catastrophic fire behavior such as occurred in the Oakland/ Berkeley Hills Fire of October 1991. Catastrophic fires can destroy large numbers of homes, threaten public safety and severely damage the natural areas which contribute to our high quality of living.

A key goal of local community fire protection planning is to reduce the level of fire hazards in the Kensington wildland intermix area, designated as a VHFHS zone. While it is not possible to eliminate all threats of catastrophic wildfire, fire hazards can be reduced to acceptable levels and still allow a "green" Kensington.

Vegetation management planning in the VHFHS zone focuses on areas where fire poses the greatest risk to life and property. There are three specific goals of the program:

- 1. Keep all fires small. Small fires generally are cooler than large fires and are more easily extinguished.
- 2. Limit the speed with which any fire will grow. Fires need fuel to burn; if fuel is available, fires will continue to grow rapidly. Fuel must be limited or made unavailable to spreading fire.
- 3. Make it more difficult for fires to ignite and spread. Small fires can ignite progressively larger fuels. Small fuels are like kindling and are easily ignited. Reducing kindling fuels, and separating kindling fuels from larger fuels reduces sources for ignition and the potential for fire spread.

Fires will continue to be a part of California urban living. By implementing vegetation management standards, Kensington residents can significantly reduce the potential that a small fire will grow into a catastrophic event involving one or more structures. The primary method of stopping fire spread is by increasing separation distances between combustible fuels. An important component of reducing the community's fire risk requires vegetation management to be practiced by property owners.

B. Fire Safe Vegetation Management Concepts

There are three basic methods employed to manage vegetation fuels: firebreaks, fuel breaks and ornamental landscaping. A <u>firebreak</u> eliminates all flammable vegetation and combustible growth.

Appropriate ornamental landscaping is acceptable in this area. A <u>fuel break</u> reduces the fuel mass of

flammable vegetation and combustible growth, thereby limiting the intensity of fire and slowing its rate of spread. Ornamental landscaping provides a yard or garden with decorative fire resistive plants that are irrigated, maintained and arranged to be aesthetically pleasing, functionally useful and enhance fire safety. Refer to the definitions listed for these terms.

Within the VHFHS zone, structures are to be protected from wildfire by creating firebreaks immediately surrounding structures and fuel breaks further out from structures. Within 30 feet of a structure a <u>firebreak</u> should be created which contains well-irrigated, maintained and appropriately spaced ornamental landscaping with fire resistant plants. All flammable vegetation and combustible growth in this area immediately surrounding a structure should be eliminated. This creates a safety margin of defensible space so that wildfire can be stopped before it reaches a structure.

A <u>fuel break</u> should be created from 30 feet to 100 feet from structures located within the VHFHS zone. The heightened risk of wildfire within the VHFHS zone makes it necessary to provide an added safety margin of defensible space for all structures and a fuel break will provide this extra protection. Fuel breaks are meant to reduce fire hazardous vegetation and maintain it to specified heights and arrangements, limiting fire intensity and impeding fire spread. The purpose of the fuel break is to deny any hot fire entering it sufficient fuel to sustain fire intensity and speed. By the time it reaches the firebreak area containing ornamental landscaping nearer the structure, the now low-intensity fire should be stopped easily by the firebreak surrounding the structure.

Ornamental landscaping with fire resistant plants is encouraged as a long term approach to maintain yard and garden vegetation in a fire safe manner. Landscaping with healthy, appropriately irrigated plants and ground cover provides a permanent reduction of the fire hazard adjacent to structures when maintained at regular intervals. Ornamental landscaping can enhance a firebreak by inhibiting the growth of weeds, grass, brush and similar fire hazardous vegetation. A list of fire resistant and highly flammable plants is available from the Fire District.

C. Process

No person shall be prosecuted criminally under the provisions of Section 4 of the Kensington Fire Protection District Ordinance 95-1 until that person has received written notice of how that property violates these standards and until that person has had the reasonable opportunity to meet with District staff concerning the violation. Civil enforcement of these guidelines as provided for in Section 5 of Ordinance 95-1, pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Section 14912 et. seq. Civil procedures for fire hazard abatement include providing the property owner with (1) written notice on how the property violates these guidelines, (2) reasonable opportunity to meet with District staff to discuss this matter and (3) opportunity to be heard before the Board of Directors of the Kensington Fire Protection District.

II. FIRE HAZARD REDUCTION GUIDELINES

Many factors combine to create a fire hazard on any specific property. It is difficult to single out a specific vegetation species or configuration to declare it either fire hazardous or completely fire safe in all situations. The Fire District has developed guidelines conforming to State Law and national fire protection standards which address most situations found on private property within Kensington. Please read these guidelines along with the accompanying glossary. If you are still unsure of how to proceed, please call the Fire Department and we will work with you to develop a fire hazard reduction plan for your property.

A. Hazard Zones

Almost the entire area of the community of Kensington lies adjacent or near to a large wildland area containing steep slopes and naturally growing trees, brush and grasses. Every year under certain critical weather conditions, the neighborhoods of Kensington are at heightened risk of seasonal wildfire

sweeping into the residential areas and burning homes. The area of Kensington at heightened risk of wildfire has been designated as a Very High Fire Hazard Severity (VHFHS) zone. The small area remaining in Kensington faces a lesser risk of wildfire.

Fire hazard reduction measures common to the entire community of Kensington are required on both vacant and developed lots:

- 1. Property owners must ensure that all vegetation, native or non-native, shall be maintained so as not to constitute a fire hazard.
- 2. Property owners must maintain their property either by ornamental landscaping or by establishing a <u>fuel break</u> along the property line and adjacent to structures. For properties within the VHFHS zone, there are additional requirements for <u>firebreaks</u> within 30 feet of structures and <u>fuel breaks</u> from 30 to 100 feet.
- 3. Property owners are responsible for clearance and maintenance of their own property only. Property owners will be required, however, to create fuel breaks on their property to protect neighboring structures. Dimensions of fuel breaks will depend on the proximity of neighboring structures and on whether the properties are within the VHFHS zone.
- 4. All brush, weeds, grass, and fire hazardous vegetation within 10 feet of any usable road surface, public way or combustible fence shall be maintained in a non-hazardous condition with a <u>fuel</u> break.
- 5. Property owners must maintain their property free from all nuisances, including debris, garbage, rubbish and trash, hazardous materials, junk and noxious growth.

B. Ornamental Landscaping

Ornamental landscaping is encouraged throughout the community of Kensington to enhance fire safety. Ornamental landscaping consists of decorative plants growing within a tended garden or yard which are well-watered, maintained and located to provide aesthetic decoration and functional utility, such as privacy screening, shade, weed suppression and erosion control.

Within the VHFHS zone, ornamental landscaping in the 30 foot firebreak adjacent to structures must meet the following requirements:

- 1. Ornamental landscaping shall be maintained free of dead wood and litter, and trimmed of small twigs and branches at least two (2) feet or 1/3 of their height from the ground, whichever is less.
- 2. Ornamental landscaping must be healthy, pruned, adequately irrigated and regularly maintained so that plants and the area beneath them are free from dead or dying material.
 - 3. Single specimen trees must be trimmed and maintained.
- 4. Ground cover may be used as part of ornamental landscaping provided it is kept green, free of dead wood and litter, and at a height so that they do not form a means of rapidly transmitting fire from native growth (located outside the firebreak) to any building or structure.

C. Vegetation Management Standards

Vegetation management standards exist for the entire community, including the area designated as a VHFHS zone. Refer to the glossary for a definition of terms used in these standards.

1. Properties within the VHFHS zone:

a. Firebreaks must be created and maintained in areas within 30 feet of any occupied

dwelling.

b. Fuel Breaks must be created and maintained in areas extending from 30 to 100 feet

surrounding

c. <u>Fuel Breaks</u> must be created and maintained on vacant lots <u>30 feet wide along the property</u> line and <u>100 feet from neighboring structures</u>.

2. Properties outside the VHFHS zone:

- a. Fuel Breaks must be created and maintained in areas within 30 feet of any structure.
- b. <u>Fuel Breaks</u> must be created and maintained on vacant lots to be <u>10 feet wide along the property line</u>.

3. Vegetation Management Standards for Firebreaks:

- a. All flammable vegetation or combustible growth must be removed and cleared away, thereby eliminating fire hazardous vegetation fuels which can rapidly transmit fire.
- b. Adequately irrigated and maintained ornamental landscaping is not flammable vegetation or combustible growth, and is encouraged within a firebreak.
- c. Trees, shrubs, bushes or other vegetation adjacent to or overhanging any structure shall be maintained free of dead limbs and other combustible matter such as vines and loose papery bark. On mature trees, limbs should be removed up to 10' above the ground. Smaller trees should be limbed to 1/3rd of their height up to 6' above the ground, but in no case less than 18 inches from the ground.
- d. Trees shall be maintained so that no portion is closer than 10 feet from any chimney opening.
- e. All roof surfaces shall be maintained free of substantial accumulations of needles, twigs, and any other combustible matter.
- f. All cut vegetation and debris must be disposed of either by hauling and dumping in a lawful manner, or by chipping and dispersing over the property in a manner and to a height which will not constitute a fire hazard.
- g. Chipped materials which are spread on the ground shall be of a size no greater than 1 inch by 1 inch by 3 inches.

4. Vegetation Management Standards for <u>Fuel Breaks</u>:

- a. Maintain ornamental landscaping in yards.
- b. All fire hazardous vegetation with the exception of weeds and grass shall be cleared and maintained to a height no greater than 18 inches above the ground.
- c. All weeds and grass shall be cleared and maintained at a height no greater than 6 inches above the ground.
 - d. Remove from trees all vines, loose papery bark and dead branches.

- e. All cut vegetation and debris must be disposed of either by hauling and dumping in a lawful manner, or by chipping and dispersing over the property in a manner and to a height which will not constitute a fire hazard.
- f. Chipped materials which are spread on the ground shall be of a size no greater than 1 inch by 1 inch by 3 inches.

5. Additional Considerations for Vegetation Management:

- a. The Fire Hazard Abatement Program is intended to promote community fire safety by reducing the combustible vegetation fuel mass on private properties. Clearing vegetation by heavy construction methods, such as grading, discing, trenching or dozing shall require special permits from the County. **Disposal by burning is not permitted.**
- b. Any parcel where slope stability will be threatened by removal of plants may be exempt from treatment requirements or subject to alternate treatments. The property owner must submit a report documenting the probability of slope failure due to vegetation removal, prepared by a licensed civil, geotechnical, or soils engineer. The report shall propose alternative treatment methods to address fire hazards. The report will be reviewed by staff. Review and acceptance by the district of alternative treatment will supersede other requirements.
- c. Any parcel or lot which includes plant or animal species that are rare, endangered or of special concern may qualify for alternative plant treatment and spacing requirements. The property owner must submit a report from a qualified resource biologist or landscape architect describing the species, actions required to preserve. The report will be reviewed by the district. Review and acceptance by the district of alternative treatment will supersede other requirements.

D. Planting Considerations

Any plant will burn if the conditions are right. Some plants are considered to be extremely flammable while other plants are considered to have some resistance to fire. Verifiable tests of fire exposure characteristics for all specific ornamental landscaping plants is not available.

The best available plant information is contained in a publication available from EBMUD entitled "Firescape: Landscaping to Reduce Fire Hazard". A list of plants with some fire-resistance and plants considered highly flammable is available from the fire district.

At the base of trees and shrubs, replace flammable vegetation with bark, mulch, rock, gravel or low-growing or more fire-resistant ground covers. This cover reduces the fire danger and minimizes weeds. Avoid placing medium-sized shrubs beneath trees or taller shrubs. By breaking up the available fuel mass in ornamental landscaping, a fire will be kept at lower intensity, flame lengths will be shorter and fire will be less likely to form a continuous line or front.

E. Structural Fire Safety

The District's roofing and vegetation management standards are designed to reduce the amount of airborne burning material, limiting fire spread. Once a fire starts, it is often accelerated by wind-borne burning material. Burning embers or brands are the main source of fire spread in mixed urban-wildland areas. The roof of a house is most vulnerable to this type of ignition. Spark arresters with a maximum of 1/2" openings in the mesh are required over the outlet of every chimney. Class A is the top rating for fire resistive roofing, followed by Classes B and C. State law and District Ordinance requires that all roofing within the VHFHS zone be Class B or better in new construction or replacement of more than 50 % of the roof.

III. GLOSSARY OF TERMS

The following terms are used to describe the vegetation management standards in California State Law and in the Kensington Fire Protection District's Fire Hazard Reduction Program.

Very High Fire Hazard Severity (VHFHS) Zones: Any geographic area designated per Government Code section 51178 to contain the type and condition of vegetation, topography, weather and structure density to potentially increase the possibility of wildland conflagration fires. As a community adjacent to extensive wildland areas, almost the entire community of Kensington is designated as a VHFHS zone. A map of this zone is available from the Fire District. Fire hazard reduction standards are more extensive for properties located within the VHFHS zone.

Defensible space: A concept in landscape design for homes which provides a band of managed vegetation around a home that slows movement of fire by reducing or denying fuel and provides a space for fire fighters to take a stand to protect the house.

Fire resistant plants: A relative term used to describe plants that are "more resistant" or "less resistant" than other plants to fire. Given enough heat, <u>all</u> vegetation will burn. Yet plants in fact differ in how fast they burn, how high a flame they produce and their ability to survive fire. Fire resistance is enhanced by higher amounts of moisture within twigs and foliage. Fire-resistant plants can lose this quality altogether if not properly maintained and irrigated. A partial list of fire resistant and highly flammable plants is available from EBMUD (232-5051) and the Fire District.

Fire hazardous vegetation: Plants which can burn easily because they generate dry undergrowth, contain flammable oils or produce significant quantities of dead or dying material. Hazardous vegetation is fuel which must be removed or strictly maintained so as not to constitute a fire hazard by igniting easily and then contributing to rapid fire spread. Seasonally dry grass, weeds, brush, and unmaintained and unirrigated trees and ornamental vegetation are examples of fire hazardous vegetation. Properly chipped, mulched and disbursed material does not constitute fire hazardous vegetation. Fire hazardous vegetation is also known as flammable vegetation and combustible growth.

Ornamental landscaping: Decorative plants growing within a tended garden or yard which are appropriately irrigated, maintained and located to provide aesthetic decoration and functional utility, such as privacy screening, shade, weed suppression and erosion control. The use of fire-resistant plants and the removal of fire hazardous vegetation will enhance fire safety.

Firebreak: An area in which all flammable vegetation or combustible growth is removed and cleared away, thereby <u>eliminating</u> fire hazardous vegetation fuels which can rapidly transmit fire. Ornamental landscaping is permissible within a firebreak as long as it is adequately irrigated, maintained and spaced so as not to provide a means of rapidly transmitting fire. Compare to **fuel break**.

Fuel break: An area in which all flammable vegetation or combustible growth is reduced and cleared away according to established standards, thereby <u>limiting</u> the mass and arrangement of fire hazardous vegetation fuels which can rapidly transmit fire. Appropriate ornamental landscaping is permissible within a fuel break. Fuel reduction standards for fuel breaks limit the height of certain vegetation (brush, native shrubs, weeds and grasses), remove from trees any fuels which can ladder fire into the canopies, and provide adequate spacing between remaining plants. Compare to **firebreak**.

Alameda and Contra Costa Wildland 2010

Seven Firefighters received live fire training on June 23 and 24 at the Wildland 2010 Training Exercise held at Camp Parks.

The focus of this drill was to exercise Wildland Firefighting Strategies and Tactics, utilizing the ICS System. The hands on training included progressive hose lays, hand line construction, mobile fire attack, water supply and safety in the Wildland Environment. Several hundred acres of grassland was burned during this event.

Battalion Chief David Gibson was assigned as the Operations Chief for this training with the overall responsibility of the entire training program. Other members of the department received training in the hands on section of this event.

Control Burning of Slash Piles

During the next few weeks, the Fire Department will be busy control burning vegetation (slash) piles within the Hillside Natural Area (HNA). Once this vegetation management project has been completed, engine companies can begin prescribed burning in the areas of the HNA around Potrero Hill and off of Schmidt Lane in El Cerrito. The Fire Department crews have report that the HNA grasses have remained much greener this year due to the late rain fall, based on this fact the majority of the departments Prescribed Burning will take place later in the season. As always notice will be given before the burns take place.

On July 27 at 4:00 a.m. Fire Captain Kevin Janes was requested to respond to the "Bull Fire" in the Sequoia National Forest near Kernville as part of the "California Interagency Incident Management Team #4." Information on the fire at the time of this report was still somewhat limited due to the isolated location.

What is known is that on July 26 at approximately 1:45 p.m., a vegetation fire was reported in the area of Burlando Road, west of the Kern River near Kernville. The fire quickly grew to 2,000 acres in rough terrain of grass and heavy vegetation in Bull Run Creek and doubled in size again by that evening. As of July 28th, the fire had grown to 15,000 acres and was only 5 percent contained. At this time, there are approximately 500 personnel on scene with many more enroute. Approximately 200 firefighters are battling the fire on ground with assistance from seven water dropping helicopters and seven air tankers.

Six homes have been burned in the path of the Bull Fire. More structures are threatened by the fire on both sides of the Kern River and many communities have been evacuated. There are structural protection groups assigned to these areas. There are no reported injuries.

This fire as well as many more in the northern Sierra's is believed to be the result of the dry lighting storms that moved across the State over the weekend. More lightning strikes are being predicted for this week. Please keep Captain Janes and citizens of this community in your thoughts.

Thank you for your email of July 22, 2010. The Kensington Fire Protection District is happy to provide the LAFCO Commission with an update on the District.

As noted in LAFCO's 2009 Fire and Emergency Medical Service Providers Municipal Service Review, the Kensington Fire Protection District continues to provide excellent fire and emergency medical service, is accountable to the Kensington community and creates many opportunities for public outreach, shares facilities and cooperates with other local Kensington agencies and like agencies within the County, all while remaining financially solvent.

Of the three governance alternatives identified in the MSR, it is feasible to have LAFCO amend KFPD's SOI to include the EBMUD reservoir; however, KFPD already serves the area in question through automatic mutual aid and service will not be affected with or without the SOI change. In addition, the LAFCO Commission should note that the reservoir property as identified is not solely in Contra Costa County but partially lays in Alameda County.

Regarding the option of consolidation with the Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District, and as clearly stated by KFPD in previous letters, no streamlining was identified by the LAFCO consultant in the MSR. It has been brought forward at several community meetings that consolidation would actually create far less representation for Kensington citizens within its local agencies, and nearly all public opinion received from our constituents did not favor this option. Also, as identified in the MSR, KPPCSD has resolved its financial challenges by passing a parcel tax measure on the June 8, 2010 ballot which is another indication of the Kensington voters' desire "in exercising greater control over the share of local property tax dollars..."*

Belinda Espinosa, City Manager, Pinole is the chair of the West County Technical Advisory Committee that is discussing regional issues within the fire service. We defer to Ms. Espinosa to report updates concerning this committee.

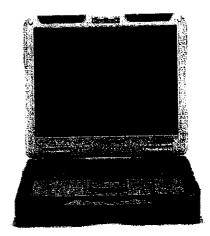

RE: Wildland Web Gear Hydration Pack Upgrade

A few years ago the KFPD Board of Directors purchased Wolf Pack Gear wildland harness systems for each firefighter to securely hold our fire shelters, gloves and other tools required for proper wildland firefighting. At the time the Wolf Pack Gear product line did not offer any type of a hydration system similar to the Camel Back bladder systems used by hikers, bicyclists etc. The systems were ordered with a pouch on the belt that could hold two 16 ounce bottles of water.

Under light to moderate work load the body will loose a minimum of 32 ounces of water per hour. That amount is doubled during extreme work loads such as fighting fire, cutting fire line and making progressive hose lays. The two bottles that we currently carry provide adequate hydration for less than one hour.

Wolf Pack Gear now offers a Low Profile Hydration Pack upgrade that can hold 102 ounces of water in a Camel Back bladder system that is built into the harness and protected by the high heat fabric covering that the entire web system is constructed from. The positive note of this upgrade is that all of our current options and tools will fit on the hydration pack.

Currently through GSA purchasing, we can upgrade all 36 systems for approximately \$160.00 each or \$5,760.00. I appreciate your consideration on this matter.

Currently the vast majority of our personnel are trained to a Rescue Systems Level 1. This training is required as part of our commitment to CAL EMA and our use of OES#300. Two years ago when we purchased the new engine for Station 71, it was equipped to the same standards as the OES engine. While high angle rope rescue may not be a high priority due to lack of potential in this area, low to medium rope rescue certainly a possibility with the trails and hillside areas in both Kensington and El Cerrito

As the Operations B/C, I recommend that we equip the rest of our engines with the rope cache that we currently have on the OES engine and E71. Below is a basic list of the equipment that we would need to get E65 up to the same level of equipment.

Subcontractor List We followed up with Kel-Tec Builders on the list of subcontractors provided by them in the bid proposal. We mentioned to them that the bid proposal required them to list subcontractors whose bid amount was in excess of one-half of 1 percent of the prime contractor's total bid. Kel-Tec confirmed that they did not have any other subcontractors than the ones listed and that they were planning on doing most of the limited scope trades in house.

> We also contacted the subcontractors listed by Kel-Tec Builders and verified that they had provided a bid proposal to Kel-Tec Builders.

General Conditions Cost

We also followed up with Kel-Tec Builders on their low General Condition costs in the bid schedule. They are providing a "working" superintendent for the job who will be supervising and will also be doing other trade work. By taking this approach, they were able to spread their superintendent cost. We believe that this approach will not affect the supervision necessary for this job.

Based on our review, Kel-Tec Builders is the lowest responsive bidder and as such we recommend that the District proceed with contracting process with them.

- 2. <u>Compensation</u>. In consideration of the services rendered hereunder, Contractor shall be paid dollars in accordance with the prices as submitted on the Bid Sheet of the Proposal, attached hereto as a part of these Plans and Specifications and in accordance with the Special Provisions.
- Independent Contractor. It is specifically understood and agreed by all parties hereto that Contractor is, for the purposes of this Agreement, an independent contractor and not an employee of the District.
 Accordingly, Contractor shall not be deemed the District's employee for any purpose whatsoever.
 Contractor shall not incur or have the power to incur any debt, obligation or liability whatever for or against District.
- 4. <u>Assignment</u>. This agreement may not be assigned by Contractor, in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of District.
- 5. <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement may be canceled by District at any time without penalty upon thirty (30) days' written notice. In the event of termination without fault of Contractor, District shall pay Contractor for all services rendered prior to date of termination, and such payment shall be in full satisfaction of all services rendered hereunder.

6. Worker's Compensation Insurance. California Labor Code Sections 1860 and 3700 provide that every contractor will be required to secure the payment of compensation to its employees. In accordance with the provisions of California Labor Code Section 1861, the Contractor hereby certifies as follows:

"I am aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for worker's compensation or to under take self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and I will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this contract."

- 7. Prevailing Wages and General Rate of Per Diem Wages. Pursuant to the Labor Code of the State of California, the Director of Industrial Relations has determined the general prevailing rate of wages and employer payments for health and welfare, vacation, pension and similar purposes applicable to the work to be done. This rate and scale are on file with the District and copies will be made available to any interested party on request. The Contractor to whom the contract is awarded, and the subcontractors under him must pay not less than these rates for this area to all workers employed in the execution of this contract.

Dispute resolution is subject to the provision of Article 1.5 (commencing at Section 20104) of Division 2, Part 3 of the California Public Contract Code regarding the resolution of public works claims of less than \$375,000. Article 1.5 mandates certain procedures for the filing of claims and supporting documentation by the contractor, for the response to such claims by the contracting public agency, for a mandatory meet and confer conference upon the request of the contractor, for mandatory non-binding mediation in the event of litigation is commenced, and for mandatory judicial arbitration upon the failure to resolve the dispute through mediation. This contract hereby incorporates the provisions of Article 1.5 as though fully set forth herein.
- 9. <u>Suit; Recovery of Attorney Fees & Costs</u>. Should either party bring any action to protect or enforce its rights hereunder, the prevailing party in such action shall be entitled to recover, in addition to all other relief, its reasonable attorneys fees and court costs.

BOARD REPORTS

MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 5, 2010 FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETING OF THE KENSINGTON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

PRESENT:

CALL TO ORDER:

Director Nina Ramsey called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. and noted those present.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

None.

APPROVAL OF AUGUST 26, 2009 COMMITTEE MINUTES:

The Committee agreed to approve the minutes by consensus as presented.

REVIEW AND RECOMMEND DRAFT FY08-09 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS:

Director Kosel had several comments concerning the draft that was presented in the packet. On page 3, it appears that property taxes increased by 3% from the previous year. Kosel suggested staying with the current 2% budget for FY09-10 because of the current real estate market. Russell also pointed out a change on page 3 that the auditor had not yet incorporated under General Fund. Kosel noted that the District has now incorporated GASB 54 into the statements so that the Fund Balances show what is committed, assigned, restricted, etc. Russell explained that the \$1,094,682 on page 22 listed under Assigned to general government is the El Cerrito contract set-aside. Kosel noted the amount would roughly be doubled in size next year. Russell explained that the amount set-aside for retirees benefits in the CalPERS Trust is not reflected in the financial statements because it now belongs to the Trust. Kosel suggested fully funding the remainder of the OPEB amount now. Russell said that the District currently has nearly 1.4 million in the Trust plus gains interest. It would not be a good idea to overfund because the money would be tied up until the OPEB liability is gone. The District can start paying the retirees health benefits out of the Trust immediately. Russell suggested having the actuary perform a quick update to see what amount, if any, the District should still fund. Navellier handed out the PERS Trust balance sheet as of 9/30/09. The District also needs to be careful with cash on hand because of the large remodel that is coming up. Further discussion followed about cash on hand, the remodel, the State take-away, etc. Navellier will contact the actuary. Further discussion followed on the PERS Trust. The Committee agreed that the bottom paragraph on page 22 needs to be edited. Kosel requested that the number of retirees, spouses and surviving spouses be reinserted into Note 3. A typo was pointed out on the second to last paragraph on page 16. Russell read a sentence that will be inserted at the end of the last paragraph on page 14. Russell and Navellier worked well with Lamorena & Chang overall, particularly on the bigger issues. There was a lot of back and forth communication over the minor corrections. Russell thinks the GASB 54 format is very helpful. Kosel agrees the firm puts out a very user friendly report.

MID-YEAR BUDGET VS. ACTUAL REVIEW AND RECOMMENDATIONS:

Russell pointed out that the Committee is reviewing five months of the fiscal year, not six months since the County run for December activity doesn't arrive until later in the month. The Committee asked about the building project estimate/bids. Navellier said that, based on a meeting with the construction manager and architect yesterday, bids should come in around March. The project has been moving very slowly and the County is currently contributing to that. The sidewalk work requires coordination with all of the utilities. County Building and Planning are at odds on how to proceed. The construction manager will be completing a cost estimate but the District is unclear what will be included in the project until the County agrees. Most of the costs will probably be during FY10-11. Interest income for the first quarter is less than half of the budgeted amount. The District is making interest in the CalPERS Trust though. Kosel suggested a budget amendment showing the lease income from KPPCSD. First, the lease agreement will have to be brought back to the District for a public vote. Available cash after the set-asides is projected at approximately one million. Kosel noted that the amount will be higher on July 1, 2010 because the projection is based the construction project being complete during FY09-10. The construction costs are now projected to be higher than is currently budgeted. Kosel would like the Committee to review updated five year projections at its next meeting. At that time, the construction number should be known and the Committee KFPD Finance Committee Minutes of January 5, 2010 Page 2 of 2

should have received information from the actuary. Russell pointed out that the District will also have to decide whether to impose the Special Tax for projections. Further discussion followed on the Special Tax. Russell suggested meeting in April or May when the District has actuary information and there would still be time to put additional funds into the Trust if it is recommended. She noted that the District had recently received its cash conversion from December and it can only afford to set-aside nine months of the contract fee, not 12. Further discussion followed on the contract set aside, the termination clause, and the wording of the contract. The Committee decided to postpone the mid-year budget review for the Board of Directors to the February meeting when the lease will have been publicly accepted and staff has six months worth of information.

REVIEW DISTRICT INVESTMENTS:

Navellier distributed a cash flow sheet for the next few months that included some construction costs in March and April, and moved the funds from the building set-aside to be used toward the remodel. The Board has mentioned creating a new schedule for the building set-aside after this project. The Board may decide to perform a needs assessment after this remodel. The Committee discussed the location of the building and the earth movement involved in the location. The Committee discussed the funding of the El Cerrito contract set-aside and the firefighter's contract terms.

The Committee discussed potential future meeting dates based on the remodel schedule. Kosel noted that a five year projection would be best after the FY10-11 budget is adopted and FY09-10 is complete. Navellier and Russell will work on an annual average of costs for building maintenance. The Committee briefly discussed the cost of maintaining a building on the fault line.

ADJOURNMENT:	The meeting was adjourned at 2:15 p.m.

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Chairpeisgn Boarmen Introduced Donald A Blumbaugh, Executive Director of the Contracosta Mayors Conference. Mr. Blumbaugh retired as City Manager of Walnut Creek in 2002 after 14 years of Service. He has previously served as City Manager of Hayward and Palm Confines and was Assistant to the City Manager of Riverside after earning his graduate degree from the Whalner School at the University of Penosylvania and project his 44 year career he has worked on regional and statewide issues affecting local government. He has served as President of the California City Managers and on the statewide poartrof the League of the California Cities & After retirement, he managed Shaping Out Futures a countywide community based visioning project to create a plant of Contra Costa's growth over the next 20 years. He also worked on an effort to create a countywide mutually agreed upon urban growth boundary

Mr. Blumbaugh spoke in depth regarding his views on solutions for "fixing" the State oppositions for "fixing" the State opposition current and future State budgets. Mr. Blumbaugh stated that we cannot have a State budget that is broken. However we still vote for more debt through bond issues. We cannot pay for what we have now. Why would we hink we can pay for it in the future? We are just passing along the cost to turure generations think we can pay for the Governor and State Legislature are at a historical low, but we keep the electing the incumbents. There is no solution to the budget; we keep doing what we're doing but expecting different results.

The current budget crisis is a "symptom" of a greater problem – the current structure of the State Government does not work. However, the ability to change how the State government operates is very limited. A comprehensive exam of the State Constitution needs to be completed and conducted from outside the Legislature. One of the first points to be changed would be the ability to change the State Constitution by public vote. Additional changes would include:

- A five-year financial plan. The plan needs to include a provision that no new programs can be implemented unless there is an identifiable source of funding. New programs would also require a two-thirds vote of the Legislature.
- Development of a statewide vision/ plan.
- A multi-year State budget, preferably a two-year budget. Most importantly, the budget must be truly balanced.
- Require a two-thirds vote to increase taxes.
- Require that any addition to the budget must have a funding source.
- Consider a one House Legislature, instead of two.
- Limit campaigning to six to eight weeks. This would cut back on the money needed to compete in an election.

East Bay Regional Park District - Park Advisory Committee Report

E. J. Shalaby, West County Wastewater District, provided an update on Measure VWV improvements. Of the \$500 million raised by Measure WWV. \$375 million (75%) will fund regional park acquisitions and capital projects, with \$26.2 million (7%) held in reserve for unanticipated future needs and opportunities. In addition, \$125 million (25%) of proceeds will go to cities, special park and recreation districts, and county service areas for their park and recreation services.

Sherry Sterrett, Pleasant Hill Recreation & Park District, reviewed CSDA legislative and educational highlights. Ms. Sterrett also distributed information on the CSDA/Chapter New Member Incentive Program.

District of the Quarter Recognition—Park Districts

The **Ambrose Recreation and Park District** was formed in 1946. At the time the district was formed it included only one park site: Ambrose Park Jocated south of Highway 4 off Bailey. Road. Since 1946, the park district has acquired and developed three additional parks. Anuta Park on Willow Pass Road at Solano Avenue; and a mini park on Alves Lane.

The Ambrose Elementary School, which now serves as the Ambrose Community Center, was built by the Mt. Diable Unified School District in 1935. It subsequently was closed by the school district at the end of the school year 1973. The Ambrose Recreation and Park District began hegotiations with the school district in 1977 to acquire the building for renovation and use as a community center to provide recreational services to the community of Bay Point. The park district then applied for and was successful in acquiring both Community. Development Block Grant funds through Contra Costa County and Roberti-Zberg Grant funds through the State of California for the purchase and necessary renovations to transform the dilapidated, abandoned building into a beautiful Ambrose Community Center. In addition to

serving as the district offices, the Community Center currently offers a senior citizen nutrition site with lounge area, Contra Costa County Service Integration Team offices, indoor recreational facilities (The Ambrose Computer Lab, weight room, class rooms, auditorium with stage, etc.), conference room, kitchen, dining room and auditorium available for rental. Outdoor facilities include two baseball fields, 6 basketball courts and a mini park. Since 1979 we have happily grown, and we now believe we are in need of additional space.

In November 1979 the park district moved its offices from Ambrose Park to the newly renovated Ambrose Recreation Center. Since that time this center has served as the hub of the community, serving as the meeting site of various local organizations, such as the Bay Point Municipal Advisory Council, Bay Point Traffic Advisory Committee, Boy Scouts of America (although none are currently meeting there). West Pittsburg Area Foundation, and local 4-H clubs, to name a few. The community center has also been widely used for local public forum meetings by county, state and federal agencies, political representatives and the private sector.

The East Bay Regional Park District, established in 1934, has a fascinating history and an inspiring story. We began with a vision of far-sighted civic leaders seeking to preserve excess watershed land in the Oakland and Berkeley hills. Their goal was to create a park district as part of the community, one that retained a balance of recreation opportunities and wilderness features, ideas unheard of at the time. Members of a grassroots land preservation movement placed a measure on the ballot. During the depths of the Great Depression it passed by a surprising 71 percent and created the first regional park agency in the nation—the East Bay Regional Park District.

Thanks to the support of residents throughout the past seven-and-a-half decades, the East Bay Regional Park District now encompasses all of Alameda and Contra Costa counties. Spanning more than 100,000 acres with 65 parks and over 1,100 miles of trails, our District is the largest regional park district in the nation. True to the ideas of our founders, our mission contides to be providing recreational opportunities, preserving the natural beauty of the land, and protecting wildlife habitat.

I am writing to express my appreciation for you and your paramedic crew's attendance at our house yesterday evening. I had called 911 when I found that my wife had a heart rate of over 200 beats per minute. You were here almost at the point of my putting the phone down.

The fireman who arrived came in, had the correct equipment for the problem, immediately placed a heart monitor on her, diagnosed the problem, and almost immediately administered a treatment which brought her heart rate down to normal. An ambulance arrived and we took her to Alta Bates Hospital, where the problem was appropriately diagnosed.

The paramedics who arrived were polite, kept me informed of what was happening, and careful to leave the house clean when they left.

My deep appreciation for the kind and prompt attention you paid our house last night; after all had it not been for your help, I might not have a wife today.
